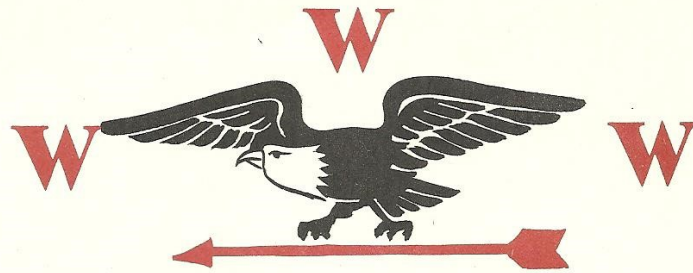

GENERAL INFORMATION

We hope that all arrowmen will govern their activities by the Scout Oath and Law. Each person will be expected to observe state and local laws and camp regulations. Use of drugs, alcohol, fireworks, firearms, or gambling will not be tolerated. Anyone violating these regulations will be turned over to the local authorities. The area of the Ranger's cabin is off limits during the entire Conference. Have an enjoyable weekend and don't hesitate to ask a Timuquan member for any needed help.

CONFERENCE HEADQUARTERS

Conference Headquarters is in the Camp Headquarters. (See map in this pamphlet).

FEE

Your fee of \$8.00 covers the cost of food, insurance, conference program and one conference patch.

SOUVENIRS

Additional patches, mugs, neckerchiefs, etc. will be sold at the trading post during the conference. (See the Smoke Signals for more information).

CAMP SITES

All lodges are solely responsible for cleanliness of their own camp sites. A lodge's site is its home for the weekend. Don't enter another site without first being invited.

VEHICLES

Vehicles are not allowed inside camp. Please use the provided parking areas only.

LEAVING CAMP

No one will leave camp during the conference without good reason. Check with your lodge advisor and a Section Officer first.

FIRST AID

First aid is available at the Health Lodge at all times during the conference. (See camp map).

MEALS

Meals will be served in the Dining Hall. Each person must present their meal ticket at every meal. People holding blue meal tickets will eat first, and as they leave the Dining Hall those with white meal tickets will enter and eat.

UNIFORMING

Arrowmen should remain in complete and official uniform through the Conference. Shoes MUST be worn at all times.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Church services will be held Sunday at 9:30 A.M. Location will be announced later.

SMOKE SIGNALS

The Smoke Signals will be the official newspaper of this Sectional Conference. It will be published and distributed several times during the weekend. Please consult it for last minute changes and general news.

PHONE CALLS

Phone calls will be made from Camp Headquarters. Approval of your Lodge Advisor and authorities in Headquarters is necessary before making a call.

PATCH TRADING

All patch trading will take place during free periods. The Dining Hall and Maintenance Building will be open for this purpose.

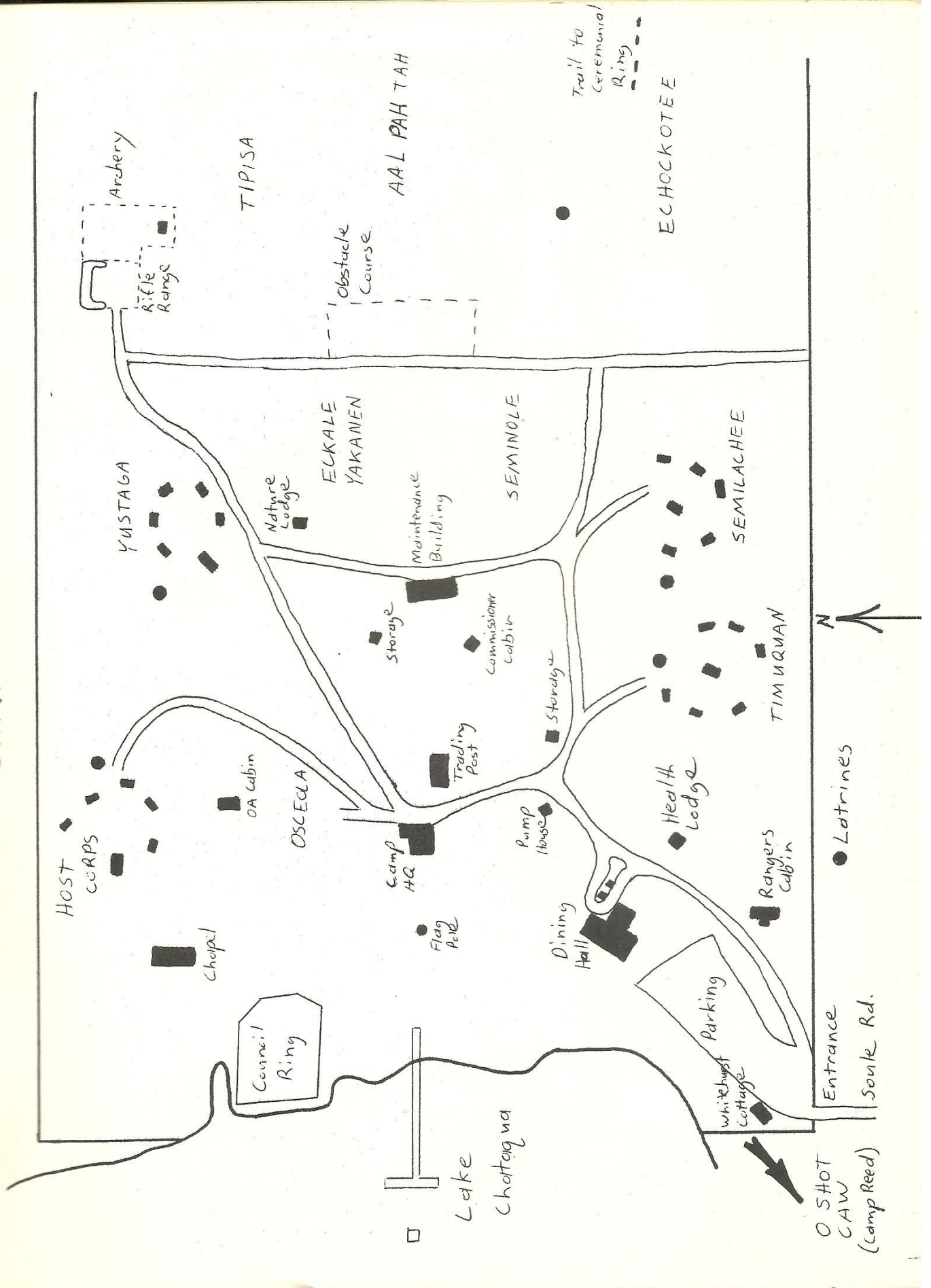
LIABILITY

QUEST OF THE GOLDEN ARROW

The quest includes athletic and scoutcraft competition between lodges. The quest will be on Saturday afternoon from 2:00 until 5:00. The events are as follows:

- Obstacle course
- Tug-of-War
- Mile relay - four quarter mile legs
- Canoe race - canoe out around marker and back
- 100 yard dash
- Riflery - use own gun or one provided
- Adult Canoe Fill - two adults with one can and one paddle try to fill and swamp competitor's canoes. Last one afloat wins.

FESTIVAL OF FEATHERS

The Festival of Feathers is the Indian Lore competition among lodges. This competition will take place on both Friday and Saturday nights. Individual pow-wow competition will be divided into Modern and Old-time, with novice and professional divisions. A novice dancer will be "any member who has been a novice for less than two years and has won no outside awards other than in local lodge competition." Professional dancers will be all others. All competitors in all events must be under 21 years of age. The Indian Lore competition schedule is as follows:

Friday
Story solos
Chanting teams
Individual pow-wow comp.
Informal pow-wow

Saturday
Final pow-wow competition
Costume explanation
Skill solos
Group dances
Informal pow-wow

Story solos must be of a non-religious nature and there is a 10 minute maximum time limit. Chant teams may have up to three songs with a 15 minute maximum. Explanations must be given for the songs. Individual pow-wow competition will begin on Friday night with final run-offs on Saturday night. Costume judging will be Saturday, immediately after lunch and lasting the length of the quest. 2:00 - 5:00 P.M. Contestants are to report to the judges when convenient for the individual. Costume judging categories will be the same as those for pow-wow competition. Skill solos will be no longer than 10 minutes long and an explanation must be presented to the judges. Each lodge may enter one skill solo and one story solo. Group dances must be of a non-religious nature with a 20 minute time limit. This includes set-up, explanation, performance, and take-down.

BEST ALL AROUND LODGE

A trophy will be presented to the best all-around lodge at the section Meet. The host lodge is exempt from this trophy and will choose the winner. The criteria for judging is as follows:

1. Scrapbook and display of it at the site
2. Spirit
3. Lodge appearance
4. Camp site appearance
5. "Where to go Camping" booklet
6. Description and efficiency of lodge bookkeeping systems
7. Copies of lodge publications
8. Prompt pre-registration
9. Overall efficiency and operation of the lodge

Items 5, 6, and 7 are in booklet form.

AREA HISTORY

Area VI-E and the idea of an annual Area Conference was established in 1945 at Camp Echockotee near Orange Park, Florida. The eight original Area VI-E Lodges were: Aal-Pah-Tah, Calusa, Echockotee, Kiondasha, O-Shot-Caw, Pilthako, Semilachee, and Tipisa.

Many changes have occurred with Florida Lodges since then. Kiondasha was later renamed Seminole. Calusa Lodge was dropped and later reorganized as Eckale-Yakanen. Pilthako was moved to Area VI-C and the next year to Area VI-D. Semilachee was moved to VI-D. Timuquan and Chiriqui Lodges were formed in the very late 1940's (Timuquan in 1948). At one time O-Shot-Caw was dropped but later reformed in the mid 1950's under the same name. In 1968 Echockotee Lodge was transferred to Area VI-C and Osceola Lodge was formed and added to the Area.

Area VI-E retired in 1972 with a history of 27 great years behind it. April 27, 28, and 29, 1973, is the first conference of Florida Lodges under their new organization as Section 6, and Timuquan Lodge has the honor of hosting it. 1973 is also Timuquan's 25th Anniversary.
