Rules and Regulations

VEHICLES

All vehicles are to be parked in the parking lot located in the Camporee Field. Only one vehicle will be allowed in camp or outside of the designated parking areas (with proper approval).

LIABILITY

All Lodges will be responsible financially and accordingly for any property or physical damage done to the camp or another Lodge by its delegates.

LEAVING CAMP

No one will be allowed to leave camp during the conference without good reason. Check with your lodge advisor and a Section Officer first.

VISITING OTHER LODGES

A Lodge's campsite is their home. Be an invited guest before entering and act accordingly.

TRAINING FLIGHTS

Delegates are requested to attend all planned training sessions and general discussions.

UNIFORMING

It is recommended that all brothers remain in proper uniform throughout the weekend. This will be a consideration toward the trophy for the best-all-around lodge.

LITTERING

Waste cans have been provided throughout the camp for disposal of all garbage. Please use them and refrain from littering the camp. We of Tipisa wish to keep our camp clean and beautiful. We hope you will help us out with proper waste disposal.



General Information

FIRST AID

Please report all accidents to the Health Lodge (refer to map). It will be attended 24 hours a day. Foot covering must be worn at all times.

CONFERENCE HEADQUARTERS

The Conference Headquarters and Communication Center will be located in the Osceola campsite. (Please refer to map.)

YOUR FEE

The "seated delegate" registration fee of \$8.00 covers all of your meals (Friday and Saturday dinner and cracker-barrel, Saturday lunch and Saturday and Sunday Breakfast), information packet, daily newsletters, insurance, and one Section Conference patch.

The "camping delegate" fee of \$4.00 includes all of the above except Friday dinner, Saturday lunch, and Sunday morning breakfast.

PHONE CALLS

All phone calls will be placed from the Rotary Lodge. The approval of your lodge lay advisor and the section lay advisor will be necessary.

TRADING POST

The Trading Post will be open throughout the weekend. The Handicraft Lodge, adjacent to the Trading Post, will be selling Section Conference items as well as National items. The times when the Trading Post and Handicraft Lodge will be open for sales will be published in your Friday newsletter. A coke stand will also be in operation in the area in front of the Trading Post.

MEALS

All meals will be in the Rotary Lodge. Meals will be on two shifts. Please check the color of your Program Booklet against the schedule for your meal times.

PATCH TRADING

All patch trading will take place during the free periods. All campsite shelters will be lit up and open for this reason. Please observe common courtesy after taps.

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RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Church services will be held Saturday Evening at 5:00 for all Arrowmen. Catholic mass as well as Protestant Vesper services will be held. Locations will be announced in the Saturday newsletter.

CHECK OUT

All campsites must be inspected by the Tipisa lodge host representative.

We hope that all arrowmen will govern their activities be the Scout Oath and Law. Each person will be expected to observe state and local laws and camp regulations. Use of drugs, alcohol, fireworks, firearms, or gambling will not be tolerated. Anyone violating these regulations will be turned over to the local authorities. The area of the Ranger's house is off limits during the entire conference except in extreme emergencies. Enjoy the weekend and don't hesitate to ask any Tipisa member for any needed help.

Elangomat

The ELANGOMAT will be the official newsletter for the Section Conference. It will be distributed four times this weekend--Friday evening, Saturday morning, Saturday evening, and Sunday morning. It will contain valuable as well as informative information. Please watch it closely for schedule changes, also. The ELANGOMAT will be distributed at the Rotary Lodge during meals and the Handicraft Lodge during sales times. *Elangomat* is taken from the Lenni Lenape Indians and translates as *friend*.

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Quest for the Golden Arrow

The Quest for the Golden Arrow is divided into three categories: fun, Scout skills, and physical fitness. Six man teams from each lodge will participate in the first six events which will be run on a rotating basis. (The membership of these teams can change from event to event.) The water events and the tug-of-war will be held after the first six events with all lodges together in one area. Archery and riflery will be held during the first six events. All competitors must be under the age of 21 and judges must be over 21. Please consult map of camp for locations of all events.

QUEST EVENTS

1. ICE SLED RUNNERS-Each team will be equipped with two boards 2"x 4" with straps which attach to the feet. Object of the race is to travel 25 yards in the shortest possible time.
2. DISTANCE MEASURING-A rope will be attached between two trees. On this rope two strings will be tied. Objective of each team is to determine the distance between the ties. Six estimates from each team will be taken and averaged. The closest team to the actual distance wins.
3. LOG HOIST-A length of rope will be thrown over a horizontal board between two trees. On one end will be tied a timber hitch to a log setting on the ground. The log must be lifted at least four feet off the ground with the rope and then tied to a stake in the ground with a clove hitch. Shortest time wins with 5 seconds added to total team time for each wrong knot.
4. CHARIOT RACE-Using six 6-foot lengths of rope and three 6-foot logs, each team will construct a chariot and pull one rider a distance of 50 yards in the shortest possible time. Five seconds will be added to total time for each incorrect lashing.
5. 100 YARD UPHILL SAND TRUDGE-Each team will run a distance of 100 yards in the best possible overall time. The six times will be averaged to determine the fastest overall team.
6. SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST-All team members must compete for the best overall time in: a hand-over-hand rope walk, walking a log fence, rope swing and cliff climb. Times will be averaged and determination of the best team will be made.



7. TUG-OF-WAR-Each team will be positioned on either side of the "Lanoche Mud Bath River: and will try to "tug" the other team into the river using the tug rope. The starting position will be standing with hands over head, the rope on the ground. Smooth soled shoes must be worn with no molded extrusions extending from the soles or heels.
8. LANOCHE AQUATHON-The first team member wearing a T-shirt begins at the swimming area fence and runs into non-swimmer area to beginner's dock where he switches shirts with the second team member. The second team member swims to the swimmer dock and switches shirts with the third team member. The third team member swims to the outermost swimmer boundary and switches shirts with the fourth team member who swims back to the swimmer's dock switching shirts with the fifth team member. He swims to the beginner's dock and switches shirts with the last team member who joins his teammates at the canoes. (During the swims of team members 5 and 6, members 1 and 2 will assume positions at a canoe and 3 and 4 will assume positions at a rowboat) Team member #6 switches shirts with one of the canoe teammates starting the Birchbark Canoe and Dugout Boat Escapade. All four team members will row and paddle out to a lake buoy and switch crafts with the other team after jumping in the water. After changing craft members, the first lodge to reach shore and properly replace all equipment will be the winners.
9. ADULT SINKATHON-Adults get one paddle and two #10 cans to try to sink advisors from the other nine lodges. No bailing canoes will be allowed!
10. RIFLERY-National Rifleman's Association rounds using rifles supplied by Camp Lanoche. Standard Junior round will be used.
11. ARCHERY-Arrowmen will shoot 10 arrows from a distance of 25 yards for best possible score. All equipment will be supplied by Camp Lanoche.

DRUM/SINGING COMPETITION

- I. Each lodge may enter one drum group.
- II. The group will provide its own drum and sticks.
- III. The Arrowmen on the drum must be under 21 years of age.
- IV. Each drum will be asked to sing three songs and discuss their drum and songs.
- V. Competition will take place Saturday evening at the campfire in the Council Ring.

DANCE COMPETITION

*All Contestants must be under 21 years of age.

- I. NOVICE
 - A. Arrowmen dancing in this particular style for a year or less.
 - B. Arrowmen not having won any recognitions (awards) for the particular style of dancing on a lodge, section, national or hobbyist level.
- II. EXPERIENCED (PRO)
 - A. Arrowmen dancing in this particular style for more than one year.
 - B. Arrowmen having won recognitions (awards) for the particular style of dancing on a lodge, section, national or hobbyist level.
- III. CONTESTS
 - A. Old time (novice)-winners may dance in pro competition.
 - B. Old time (pro)
 - C. Modern Fancy "Feather" (novice)-winners may dance in pro competition.
 - D. Modern Fancy "Feather" (pro)
 - E. Straight Dance (one category)

SKILL SOLO

- I. Arrowmen may sign up with the Saturday night program M.C. prior to the dance giving their name, lodge, and dance.
- II. This demonstration is for skill beyond that of the normal dancer such as the hoop dance.
- III. Contestants must make arrangements for their own music.
- IV. Skill Solo is not judged for quest or best section dance team.

INDIAN CRAFT COMPETITION AND DISPLAYS

Arrowmen are encouraged to enter Indian Craft articles in competition. All items should be identified by the name of the article, name of the Arrowman who constructed the article,

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and the lodge name.

All craft entries must be submitted by Arrowmen under 21 years of age. A display area will be provided by the host lodge for those not entering the competition but wishing to display their items.

Arrowmen interested in craft articles can view them from 11:00-1:00 on Saturday. Judging will take place at 1:00 and all those with entries are asked to be present to answer questions during the judging.

RULES FOR DISQUALIFICATION

- I. STORY OR SKILL SOLO
 - A. Dancer must write his own explanation.
 - B. Dancer must make his own costume and props.
- II. INDIVIDUAL DANCING
 - A. When any costume item or piece of a costume item is dropped or falls to the ground the dancer should disqualify himself if the judges do not disqualify him.
 - B. Excessive interference with any other dancers, such as crashing into another dancer or keeping him away from the drum will constitute grounds for disqualification.
- III. INDIVIDUAL CRAFT

Each item of costuming must be made by the competitor himself.
- IV. INDIVIDUAL COSTUMING

Every item worn must be owned by the competitor himself.
- V. SINGING COMPETITION

Each singing group must provide and use their own drum.

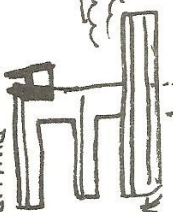
