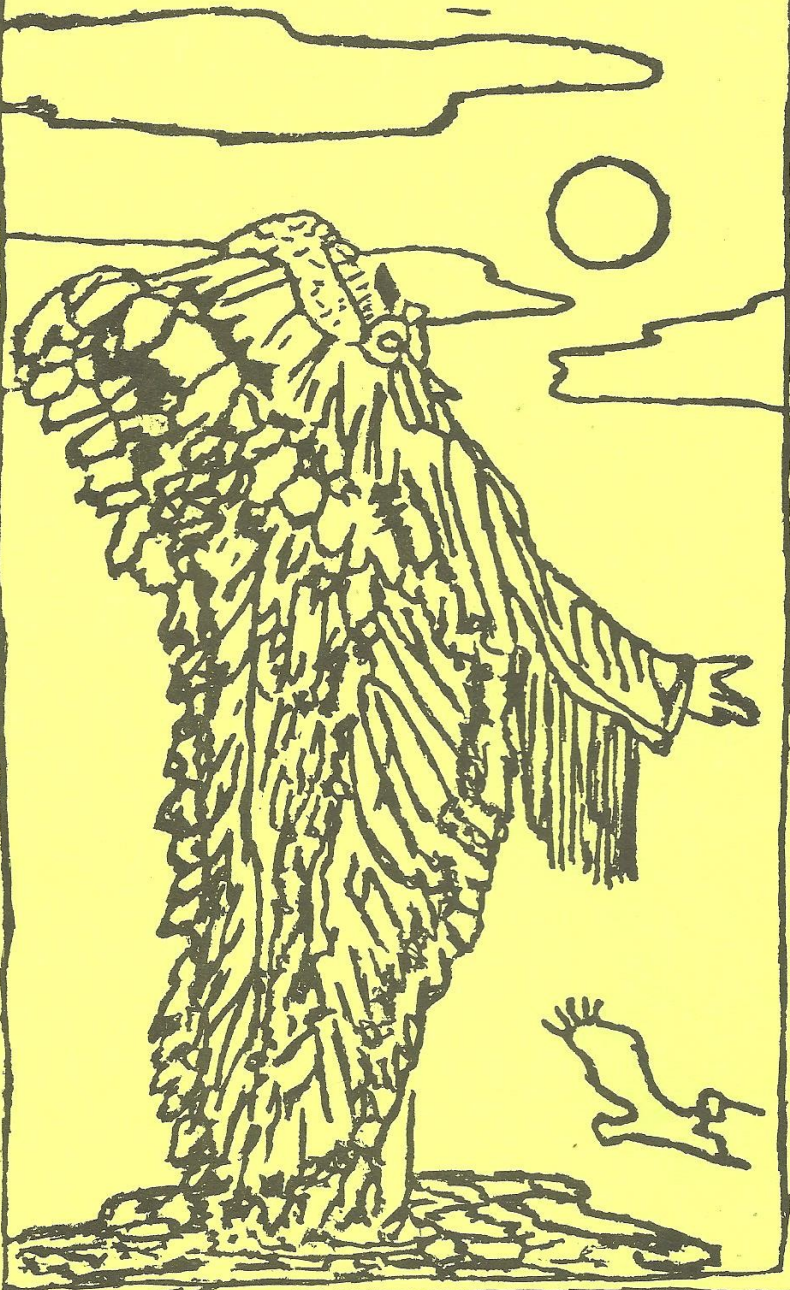

GUIDELINES

VEHICLES

All vehicles are to be parked in the Main Parking Field, located at the Reservation Gate. However, one (1) vehicle per Lodge shall be allowed in the Lodge's own camp site.

LIABILITY

All Lodges shall be responsible financially and accordingly for any property or physical damage done to the camp to another Lodge by its delegates.

LEAVING CAMP

No one shall be allowed to leave camp during the Conference without good reason and the approval of the respective Lodge Lay Advisor and the Conference Committee.

VISITING OTHER LODGES

A Lodge's camp site is their own for the Conference Weekend. No one should enter another Lodge's camp site without first obtaining their permission.

TRAINING, ETC.

All delegates are requested to attend all planned training sessions, general discussions, and evening program shows. Patch Trading shall be restricted to free times. The shelter behind the dining tent and the dining tent itself (not during meals) shall be made available for this purpose.

UNIFORMING

All brothers attending the Conference must remain in proper uniform throughout the Conference Weekend. Class "A" shall be expected for Saturday Dinner as well as the Friday and Saturday night shows. This is part of the Best All Around Lodge Criteria.

WASTE

Waste receptacles have been provided throughout the camp for the disposal of all garbage. Please feel free to use them, and thus refrain from littering the camp.

FIRST AID

First Aid is provided by the Host Lodge. Anyone experiencing any need for First Aid should go to the Camp Lone Oak Administration Building. First Aid facilities are provided within.

CONFERENCE HEADQUARTERS

The Headquarters for the 1979 SE-6 Section Conference shall be located in the Camp Lone Oak Administration Building. This is also the site for Conference Communications, Conference Publications, and Conference First Aid.

YOUR CONFERENCE FEE

Just in case you were wondering, your Conference Fee includes: all your meals (Friday Dinner, Cracker Barrel, Saturday Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner, Cracker Barrel, and Sunday Breakfast), delegate packet, timely newsletters, insurance, one Conference Patch, and a great program for the entire Conference Weekend.

MA BELL AND DIRECTORY ASSISTANCE

Phone facilities have been provided by the Host Lodge. Anyone wishing to use these facilities should feel free to do so. They shall be located in the vicinity of the Administration Bldg.

CONFERENCE TRADING POST

The Conference Trading Post shall be located in the Camp Lone Oak Quartermaster area of the Troop Service Building (This is the building between the dining tent and the pool. It shall be open Friday: 6 pm to 1 am, Saturday: 7 am to 8:30 am, 11:30 am to 8 pm, 10 pm to 1 am, and Sunday: 7 am to 8 am, 10 am to Noon. A coke stand shall also be in operation near the dining tent.

FOOD, ETC.

All Conference meals shall be served in the dining tent. Please check your program booklet for serving times.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Religious services shall be conducted Sunday morning from 8:00 to 8:30 am. Protestant Services shall be held in the Chapel, located across from the Council Ring, Catholic Mass shall be held in the Lone Oak Administration Building, and Jewish Services shall be conducted at the Nature Lodge, across from the Rifle and Archery Ranges.

SOUVENIRS

Additional patches, mugs, neckerchiefs, etc., shall be sold at the Conference Trading Post. One neckerchief, pin, mug, and patch per delegate shall be reserved until 6 pm Saturday night. The coupon reserving these items is located in your program booklet. Anyone wishing to obtain any other souvenirs is kindly asked not to do so, as this has already cost the Section both its flags and its only banner.

THE DIM AGES SENTINEL

THE DIM AGES SENTINEL shall be the official newsletter for the 1979 SE-6 Section Conference. It shall be distributed four times during this Conference Weekend: Friday evening, Saturday morning, Saturday evening, and Sunday morning. It will contain valuable as well as informative information. Watch it closely for program changes and news of current happenings. You may find THE DIM AGES SENTINEL distributed at the dining tent, which is behind the Trading Posts, during meals. Read them well, and try to collect all four!



THE QUEST OF THE GOLDEN ARROW



MARKSMANSHIP - Two participants from each Lodge. Each participant, after five rounds of practice, will shoot three targets at five rounds per target. The Lodge with the best total score will be the winner. Rifles and cartridges will be provided.

ARCHERY - Two participants from each Lodge. Each participant, after five practice arrows, will shoot 10 arrows from 25 yards for a total score. All equipment shall be supplied.

SNOW SHOE RACE - Each team has one set of "snow shoes" holding six men. The object is to travel the course in the shortest time. If a team member falls, the entire team must stop and wait for the man to get back into position. The clock is stopped when the back end of the "snow shoe" crosses the finish line.

6 MAN 7 LEGGED RACE - The legs of the six team members will be tied together (as in the normal 3 legged race). The best time over the course wins.

JAMBO LOOP RELAY - Six participants from each Lodge. The first team member will run in relay fashion, to the position of the second member and pass the baton. This will continue until the last team member has crossed the finish line.

T-SHIRT SWIMMING RELAY - Four swimmers per Lodge. Swimmers swim free style, in relay fashion, with T-Shirt on, get out of the pool and give T-Shirt to next swimmer, etc. Each Lodge must supply one, full length, unaltered T-Shirt.

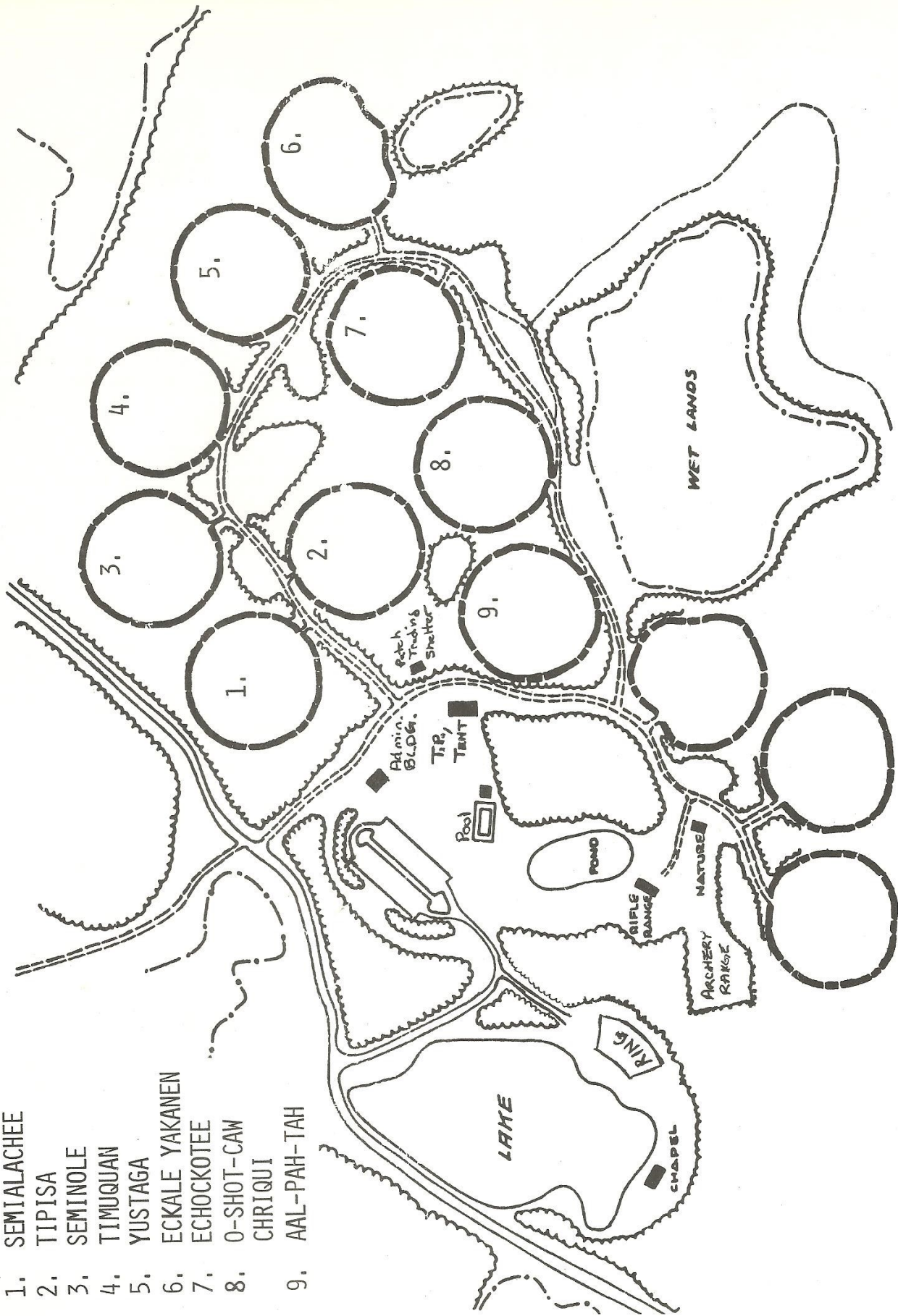
5 MAN CANOE RACE - Five arrowmen from each Lodge will stand along side a canoe and on the signal will get in and begin to paddle, using their hands. Teams will go around the markers and return to the shore. The first team to return to the shore wins.

RULES:

1. ALL CONTESTANTS MUST BE UNDER 21 YEARS OF AGE.
2. FLAT BOTTOM SHOES ONLY, NO CLEATS ALLOWED.
3. NO ONE WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE RIFLE OR ARCHERY RANGES EXCEPT FOR THE EVENTS OF THE QUEST. NO FIREARMS, BOWS, OR ARROWS WILL BE ALLOWED IN CAMP. ALL EQUIPMENT FOR THESE EVENTS SHALL BE SUPPLIED. MARKSMANSHIP SHALL BE DONE FROM THE PRONE POSITION.

POINT SYSTEM:

THE LODGE FINISHING FIRST IN EACH EVENT SHALL RECEIVE 10 POINTS; THE LODGE FINISHING SECOND, 6 POINTS; THE LODGE FINISHING THIRD, 3 POINTS; AND EACH PARTICIPATING LODGE, 1 POINT. THE LODGE WITH THE MOST POINTS OVERALL SHALL WIN THE QUEST FOR THE GOLDEN ARROW.

NOTE

Marksmanship and archery shall run during the entire Quest. It is the responsibility of each Lodge to ensure that contestants for these events show-up at the ranges to participate. All other events shall run in the order as listed in the Conference Booklet.



THE ADULT SINKATHON

This event is traditionally run by the Section Lay Advisor. Each Lodge which wishes to participate must furnish two "willing" advisors. Each team receives one (1) canoe, one (1) paddle, and one (1) number 10 can. No bailing is permitted. The last team to remain afloat, is dutifully declared the winner.

THE TUG OF WAR

Each Lodge may use up to ten individuals on its team. The competition shall be conducted on a double elimination basis. However, the finals of the competition shall be conducted on a single elimination basis. Two (2) ropes shall be used in all but the final two rounds so that 4 lodges may be participating at any given time. Reminder: NO CLEATS, NO GLOVES, AND NO KNOTS !

NATIVE AMERICAN EVENTS

Dance Competition

ALL CONTESTANTS MUST BE UNDER 21 YEARS OF AGE.

I. Novice

- A. Arrowmen dancing this particular style for 1 year or less.
- B. Arrowmen not having won any recognition (awards) for the particular style of dancing on a Lodge, Section, National, or hobbyist level.

II. Experienced

- A. Arrowmen dancing this particular style for more than 1 year.
- B. Arrowmen having won recognition (awards) for the particular style of dancing on a Lodge, Section, National, or hobbyist level.

III. Contests

- A. Old Time Novice (winners may dance in experienced events).
- B. Old Time Experienced.
- C. Modern Fancy "feather" Novice (winners may dance in experienced events).
- D. Modern Fancy "feather" Experienced.
- E. Straight Dance.

IV. Registration

Any brothers who wish to compete in any of the Native American Events must first register with the Judges. Registration shall take place immediately after Saturday breakfast, near the Conference Trading Post.



section history

In the beginning, those annual gatherings we know as Section Conferences were called Area Meetings, with eight Lodges making up what was known as Area VI-E: Aal-Pah-Tah, Calusa, Echockotee, Kiondashma, O-Shot-Caw, Pilthako, Semialachee, and Tipisa. The first "Meet" was held in November, 1945 at Camp Echockotee located in Orange Park, Florida.

Yet, many changes have taken place since this first meeting. By 1949 it was decided to schedule these Conferences during the spring of the year. Also, many Lodges underwent some changes. Calusa was renamed Eckale Yakanen, Kiondashma to Seminole, Pilthako moved to Area VI-D, O-Shot-Caw was dropped and then later reinstated, Echockotee was transferred to Area VI-C in 1968 and Osceola was formed.

After 28 years as Area VI-E, a reorganization of the Boy Scouts of America occurred in 1972, and Section SE-6 was created. At last, all the Lodges of Florida were gathered into one Section, along with parts of Alabama and Georgia, and the Canal Zone. Consisting of eleven Lodges, SE-6 has become known, noted, and respected nation wide.
