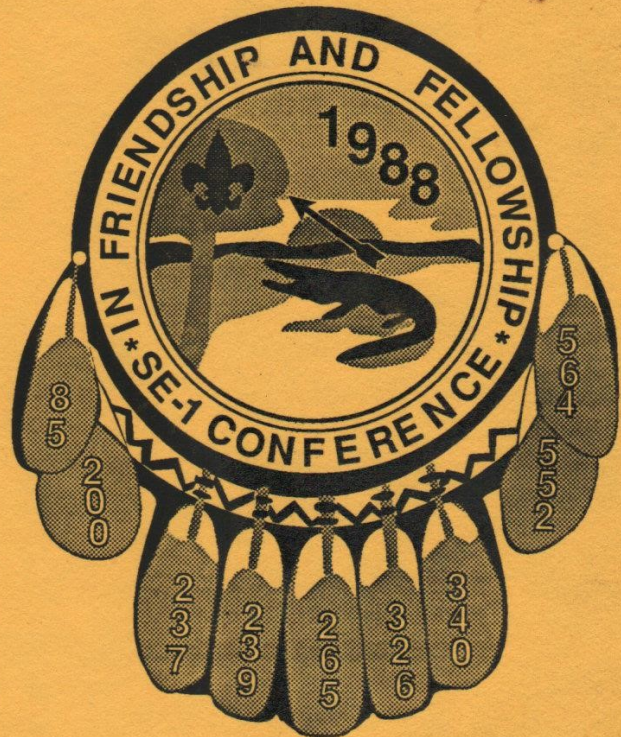



RECOGNIZING APRIL 29 THROUGH MAY 1, 1988
AS ORDER OF THE ARROW WEEK IN TEQUESTA

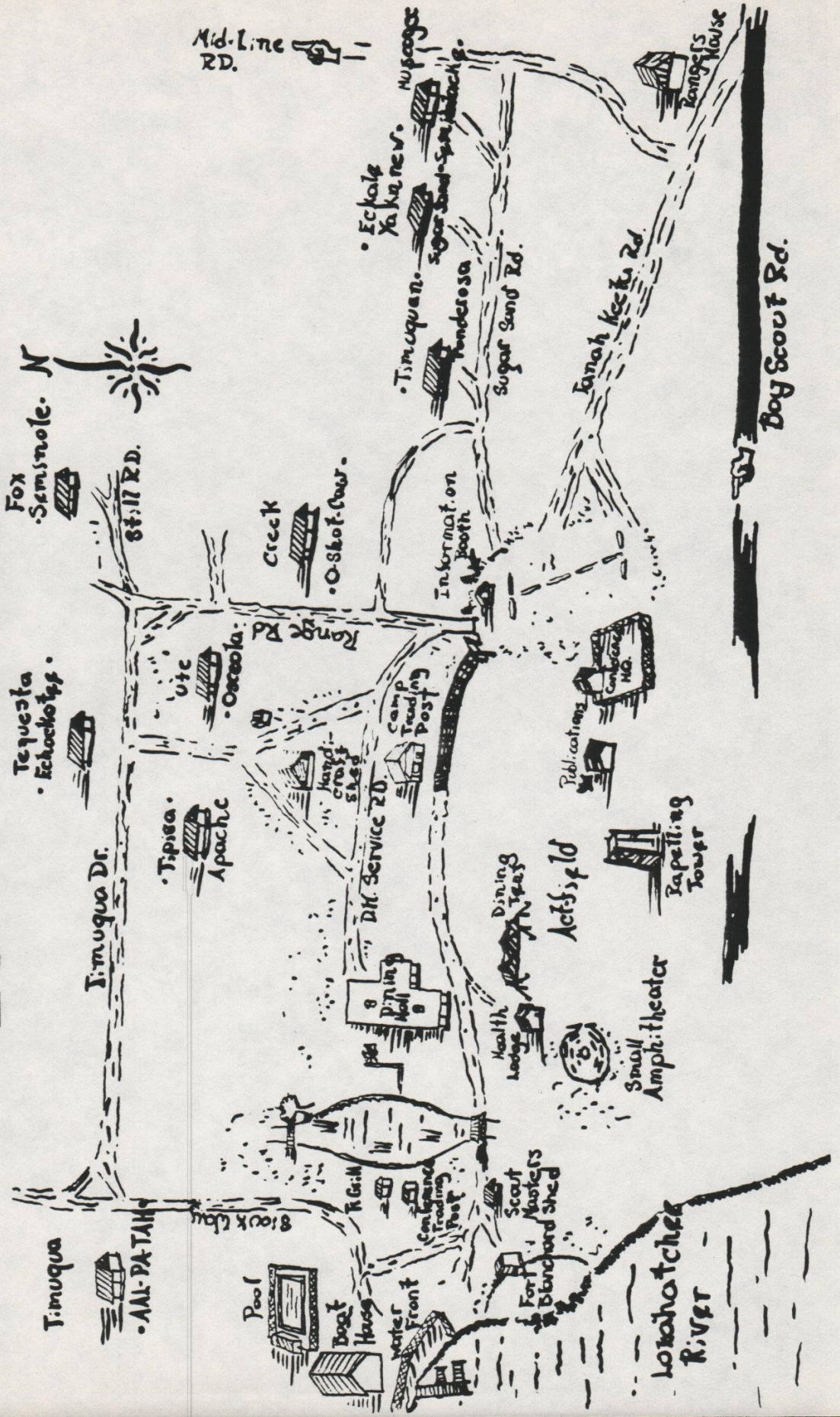

General Conference Information

Trading Post & TK Grill:

The Conference Trading Post will be selling Conference items during the entire weekend (from 4 pm on Friday until 11 am on Sunday, except during the training sessions). The TK Grill, located adjacent to the Conference Trading Post, will be operating the entire weekend, twenty four hours a day, selling various fast food items (hamburgers, hot dogs, chips, soda, etc).

Conference Training Program:

Due to the fact that one of the primary goals of the Section Conference is training, most of Saturday morning has been set aside for seminars. Because each delegate has his own unique interests and needs, nine different topics are being offered, with each delegate being able to select the three sessions which will best help him to achieve his own particular goals.

All of the lodges attending the conference will be competing for the Conference "Best Trained Lodge" Award. This award will be given to the lodge which has the best percentage of delegates attending the training sessions. Each delegate will receive three tags which they will fill out with their name and lodge and will leave with the leader of the discussion group they attend. These tags will be collected and the lodge with the best participation based on their attendance at the conference will be the winner.

Quest for the Golden Arrow:

This years Quest for the Golden Arrow is composed of the six events listed in the "Quest Events" section. In order to qualify, each lodge must compete in at least five of the six events. Lodges which choose to participate in all the events will have the lowest score of the six dropped. The events will all run simultaneously and will last the duration of the time scheduled. In this manner lodges may allocate their time to compete in both this and in the Indian and Ceremonial competitions according to their needs. Points for the lodge shall be garnished in accordance with the event descriptions. In addition each lodge shall receive five points for participation in each event. The lodge with the highest total of points from their five events shall be declared the winner of the Quest.

Special Services

-All First Aid will be coordinated through the host lodge. There will be a qualified medical person on duty in the Health Lodge through-out the Conference. Arrangements have been made with the local hospital to handle any emergency cases requiring additional medical assistance.

-There will be four issues of the Conference Newspaper, "The Friendship Flyer", issued during the conference. Arrowmen wishing to make a contribution should drop by the publications office. Candidates for Section Office wishing to have profiles published should contact the publications office Friday night.

-Security will be provided in all areas of camp including the parking lots for the duration of the Conference.

-Aal-Pa-Tah will be providing a Host Corps which will assist your lodge during their stay at Tanah Keeta. From the time you check in until you depart your Host Corps members will be their to act as your host and guide, and to insure campsite security.

-WVOA, your conference radio station, will be broadcasting the entire weekend keeping you informed of conference happenings, and bringing you the latest music, news, weather and competition reports. WVOA will be broadcasting at 1610 on your AM dial.

Group Events:

Friday Night Carnival

Why not begin a conference's excitement on Friday night? It can be done, with SE-1's Carnival Spectacular. Games and activities galore for everyone to participate in, along with prizes and awards. The Carnival will be an excellent way to kickoff the weekend by inspiring all to play and win. Lodge versus lodge and individual versus individual, there will be something to interest everyone.

Tug-of-War

This year the Tug-of-War competition will be held in two categories. Each lodge may have two teams. One comprised of 10 members, each weighing under 130 pounds, and another team made up of 10 members without any weight restrictions. The winner of the competition will be determined by double elimination. However the finals of each category will be single elimination. This event has been scheduled for the morning to allow your entire lodge to be present and to cheer for your team.

Sink-a-Thon

This time honored event is traditionally run by the Section Advisor. Each lodge which wishes to participate must furnish two "willing" advisors. Each team receives one canoe, one paddle and one #10 can. The last canoe afloat is the winner.

Conference Training Program

Training is one of the primary goals of the Section Conference. A survey of the Section's Lodge Chiefs concluded that the best way to provide meaningful and interesting seminar sessions, would be to hold a number of brief, but informative sessions, giving an overview of many topics. This view is reflected in this year's training program. In order to keep groups small and informal, two seminar leaders have been provided in a number of discussion areas. Delegates have the choice of attending three of the seminars, choosing those which they feel they will benefit from the most. All of this year's seminar leaders are extremely qualified and this year's seminar program is certain to be outstanding.

Seminole History & Culture-A (*Rick Obermeyer*) Rick intends to cover the history of indians in Florida, from Pre-Seminole to today. He will also be explaining the factors which made Seminole culture so different from what many people consider "Indian". Rick is an active member of Tipisa Lodge, and has served in many advisorial roles. (**Handicraft**)

Seminole History & Culture-B (*David Mott*) The relationship between the Seminole and the Order of the Arrow, will be David's focus. This will include Seminole based Dance and Ceremony Teams. David has been active in Osceola Lodge for many years and is a well known Seminole Hobbist. (**Fly #2**)

Everything You Wanted to Know About Becoming Brotherhood But Were Afraid to Ask-A (*Chris Fore*) This seminar will provide a new member with an understanding of the requirements for Brotherhood membership. Chris will be emphasizing the 10 months as a test of membership. Chris has served as the Lodge Chief for Osceola Lodge. (**Scoumaster's Shelter**)

Everything You Wanted to Know About Becoming Brotherhood But Were Afraid to Ask-B (*Kevin Mayeux*) Kevin will be providing an explanation of ceremony along with what needs to be done in order to fulfill the requirements for Brotherhood membership. Kevin is presently serving his second term as Seminole Lodge's Chief. (**Fly #6**)

Getting the Word Out-A (*Todd Curci*) Why good communication is important, and how to get it done will be Todd's focus. This includes producing newsletters and handling communications with the council. Todd is currently Timuquan's Vice Chief, and has served as Lodge Secretary. (**Trading Post Porch**)

Getting the Word Out-B (*John Rotruck*) John's seminar will provide information on creating publications, and will deal with other methods of communications such as phone calling and meetings. John is presently Tipisa's Publications Chairman. (**Fly #3**)

The Ordeal Beyond Ceremonies (*John Lephram*) An explanation of the keys to good Ordeal administration. This will include a discussion of the Ten Induction Principles. John is presently Osceola's Lodge Chief. (**Fly #1**)

Our Brotherhood-Past and Future-A (*John Keatly*) An overview of our history and a discussion of ways in which the Order is growing. John has served as Tipisa's Lodge Chief and has also served as a National Conference Trainer. (**W. Dining Hall Porch**)

Our Brother-Past and Future-B (*Ken Musial*) Ken will be discussing our history from the Order's creation to the present along with a discussion of possible changes in the future. Ken is presently Lodge Treasurer for Echockotee Lodge. (**Fly #4**)

A Beginners Guide to Patch Collecting-A (*Randy Yates*) Randy will be discussing patch collecting and it's relationship to scouting's history. This seminar will also include a brief history of the section as told through the patches issued by it's various lodges through the years. Randy has an active history as a member of the sections of both Florida and Georgia, and is currently a member of Atlanta's Egwa Tawa Dee Lodge. (**Dining Hall**)

A Beginners Guide Patch Collecting-B (*George Romagnoli*) George will be discussing patch collecting from the beginner's viewpoint. In addition George will discuss the ethics involved in the trading of patches. George has served as Section Secretary and is a member of Timuquan Lodge. (**Fly #5**)

Behind the Scenes of Running a Lodge (*Jon Hobbs*) A look at the things which are involved in making a successful lodge program. Also, a review of the responsibilities of lodge officers. Jon has served as Tipisa's Lodge Chief and has been an NLS Trainer. (**S. Porch of the Dining Hall**)

Beyond Work Projects (*Chris Barnash*) This seminar will deal with the ways in which a lodge can assist the council with it's program. Chris is currently an active member of Timuquan Lodge. (**Parking Lot Shelter**)

Building the Model Fun OA Fun Weekend (*Tom Sasser*) This session will include both previous examples and group participation to form a schedule of events for a truly memorable lodge weekend. Tom is presently serving as Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge Chief. (**Dining Tent**)

In order for your lodge to be eligible to win the "**Conference Best Trained Lodge Award**" you must turn in one of your colored tags at each seminar you attend. The lodge with the highest percentage of participation in the seminars will receive the award.

The Founder's Award

In 1981 the National Order of the Arrow Committee established the Founder's Award. The purpose of this award is to recognize those arrowmen who memorialize the spirit of achievement as revealed to us by our Order's founders, Dr. E Urner Goodman and Col. Carroll A. Edson. In the words of Dr. Goodman:

"The spirit, as I understand it, is the real self of the individual ... helping him to do what he thinks he ought to do in the future. It is a thing that is hard to set forth in so many words, but it is facing life as we understand it and seeking guidance and help to do our best; and that is what I pray for in the years that are ahead for the Arrowmen as they face this future, feeling that God will help them to do that which our country needs, and do it with devotion in the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service."

SE-1 Past and Present

The Section known today as SE-1 has lived through many incarnations. In 1945 Area VI-E was established. The first Conference, or Area Meet as they were then called, was held at Camp Echockotee. The eight original members of Area VI-E were: Aal-Pa-Tah, Calusa, Echockotee, Kiondasha, O-Shot-Caw, Pilthako, Semilachee and Tipisa.

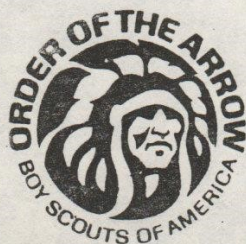
A number of changes took place during these early years. Kiondasha was renamed Seminole. Calusa Lodge was dropped and was latter reorganized as Eckale-Yakanen. Pilthanako was moved to Area VI-C and later Area VI-D. During the late 1940's Timuquan and Chiriqui Lodges were formed. At one time O-Shot-Caw was dropped, but later reformed with the same name in the mid 1950's. In 1968 Echockotee Lodge moved to Area VI-C and Osceola lodge was formed.

In 1972, Aal-Pa-Tah hosted the final Area Meet at Camp Tanah Keeta. In 1973 National reorganized the Areas into Sections. These Sections became the OA organization on the Area level. In 1973 Timuquan Lodge hosted the first SE-6 Section Conference at Camp Soule. As SE-6, the Section regained Echockotee. Also added were Yustaga Lodge from Alabama and Chiriqui Lodge in the Canal Zone.

Ten years later as part of another national reorganization our Section was changed from SE-6 to SE-1. Our first conference as SE-1 was held at Camp Soule in 1982. As part of this reorganization Yustaga was lost from the Section, leaving Echockotee, Timuquan, Tipisa, O-Shot-Caw, Aal-Pa-Tah, Eckale Yakanen, Seminole, Semilachee, Osceola, and Chiriqui. In 1987 Chiriqui, which covered the Panama Canal Zone, was removed from our Section. This year's conference, held at Camp Loxahatchee on the Tanah Ketta Scout Reservation, will be the forty-third meeting of the Lodges of Florida.
