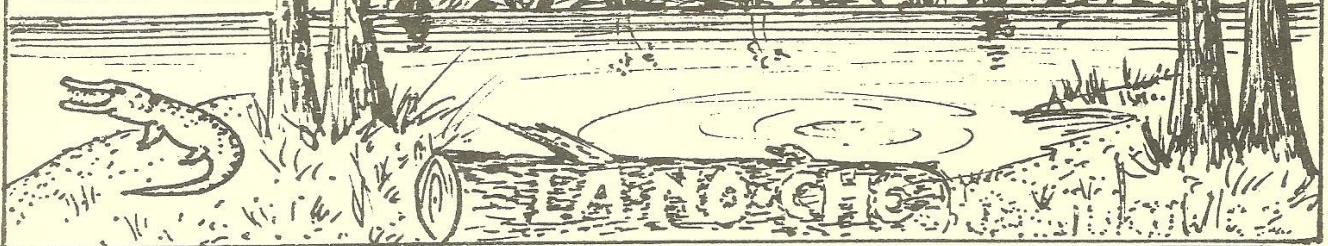

CONFERENCE BRINGS NEW STRUCTURE

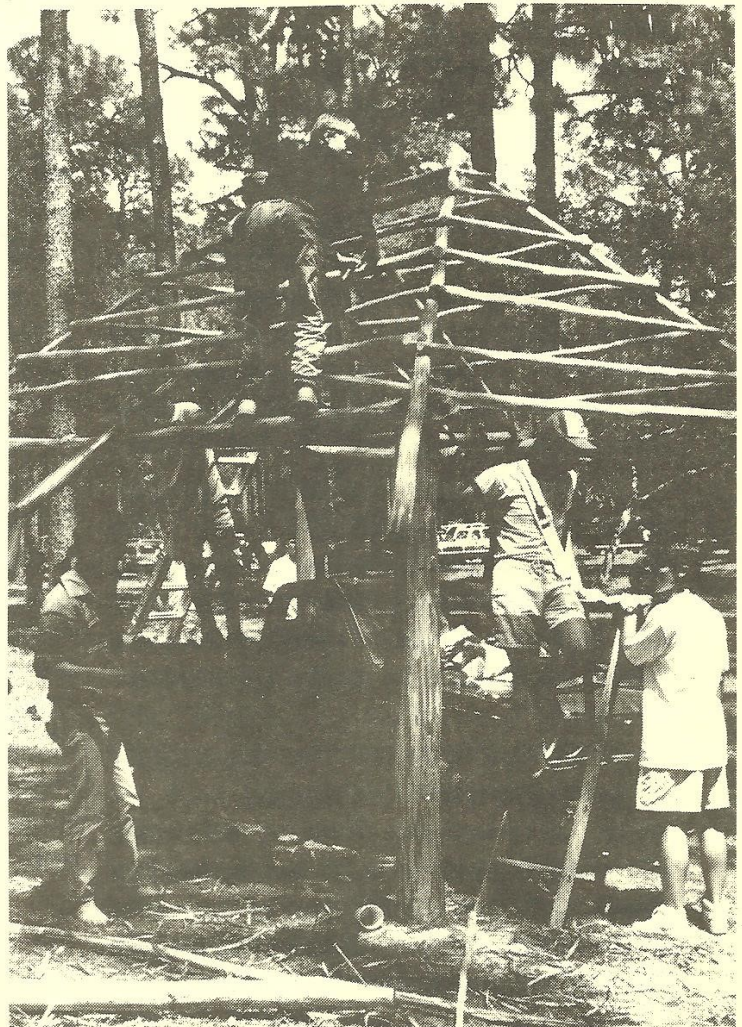
Sean "Stripped Owl" Finucane is in charge of building a new camp structure called a CHIKEE. A chikee is a Seminole Indian shelter having different purposes such as living, cooking and housing guest. Many chikees have a floor that is waist to a waist and a half high.

Sean told me, "I'm not guaranteeing anything but I plan to put in half of a wood floor". The chikee is being built for this year's section conference hosted by Tipisa Lodge # 326 here at Camp LaNoChe.

When asked about the materials used on the chikee, Sean said that the entire structure would be made of cypress with the exception of the thatched palm frond roof.

While the chikee was being built I asked scout John Wylaned what he thought about the project. He said "Building the chikee has brought everyone together and helps prevent daydreaming and arguments." John also said, "I've been working since morning and will continue thru tomorrow, maybe."

The chikee will become a permanent camp structure which may possible be used at summer camp where Indian Lore MB will be taught. The chikee will help set the stage for the Indian village and will be welcomed by all. ** Article by Garth Bremke **

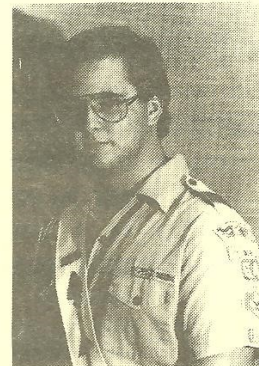
and be productive in the Order."

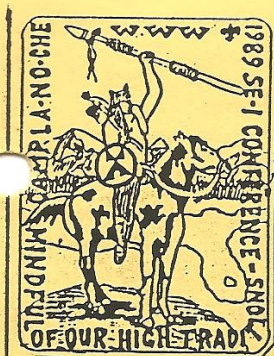

Section One has been allotted 27 spaces for the Philmont Trek based on a 3 Arrowmen per lodge quota. All crews must have 7 to 12 members and must arrive in Philmont at the same time. Each crew must have at least one 21 year old and one 18 year old.

A \$50 deposit was due April 15. After April 15, Section quotas will be forgotten and slots will be filled on a first-come, first-serve basis. The Total fee is \$175 or \$160 if turned in by June 1. ARROWMAN ABROAD

What is the OA like outside the United States? After eight years in Tipisa Lodge, I moved to Heidelberg, West Germany and found out. Black Eagle Lodge in Europe is different from any other Lodge.

Ever go to a lodge or chapter banquet? In Black Eagle Lodge of the Transatlantic Council in Europe, everyone is so far apart that even a district event may take several hours for the membership to reach it. Each district covers such a large area that each chapter is divided into sub-chapters or clans. A banquet becomes a weekend event, complete with seminars in the day and the banquet at night. In Bavaria District, in the southeastern end of W. Germany, the OA chapter holds its training weekend and banquet with the district. Imagine having a medieval banquet in 900 year old Colmburg Castle.

Where does a lodge and chapter hold their meetings and seminars? How about a chapter costume making session in Munich. The Lodge Exec. Comm. had a training weekend in Heidelberg, where they went on the historical trail in downtown Heidelberg. (The OA runs the historical trail in Heidelberg for Scouts.) Last year over 700 Scouts went on the OA tour of the old romantic city.

Where is an OA Ordeal held in Europe? The Bavaria District Chapter holds its ordeals at Camp Bayern in Garmisch, W. Germany. Camp Bayern is on an alpine mountain meadow, with an excellent view of the highest mountain in Germany. The chapter in England holds their ordeals in Gilwell Field. The Alpine District in Switzerland / S.W. Germany has its

ordeals at the Kandersteg International Scout Center in Switzerland, with the ceremony surrounded by beautiful peaks of the Swiss Alps.

How is patch trading in Black Eagle Lodge? For a veteran patch trader who transfers into the lodge, very disappointing. The lodge is not famous for good patches, and the only patch traders are OA members who were veteran traders from the States. One of the big patch traders is Tom Slavicek, the D.E. for Bavarian District, and former D.E. in Orlando. Tom is considered a radical because he introduced lodge and chapter patch designs that have more than 3 colors and with "photo" designs.

(something that is common in Fl. lodges but unusual outside the U.S.) How does the membership of Black Eagle compare to other lodges? Since most of the Lodge members are with military families overseas, they move every few years. The membership of the lodge can totally change from one year to the next. Vigil honor is much harder to receive. It is uncertain if there will be brothers in all the chapters each year. There are ten chapters in the lodge, and nobody knows if they are all active or who all the chapter chiefs and advisors are. Right now it is uncertain if the Turkey / Spain / Morocco Chapters have any brothers.

B.S.A. registration forms are even strained, imagine a fourteen digit phone number.

There are many problems that only happen with Black Eagle Lodge, but on the other side of the coin, where else can you have an authentic medieval lodge banquet or an ordeal ceremony in the Swiss Alps?

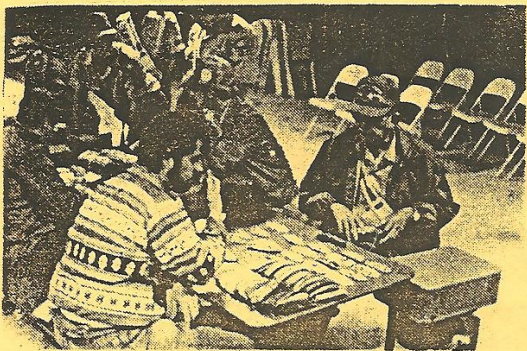

Trading patches is a very wide field. Some people collect Council Strips, while other people collect Lodge Flaps. Some Scouts collect only patches with wildlife or landscape scenes. Although most people collect a little of everything.

Most serious collectors specialize in Council Strips and Lodge Flaps. Rarity, age and color schemes help determine the value of a patch. In recent years Hat Pins have become popular as well as Council Pins.

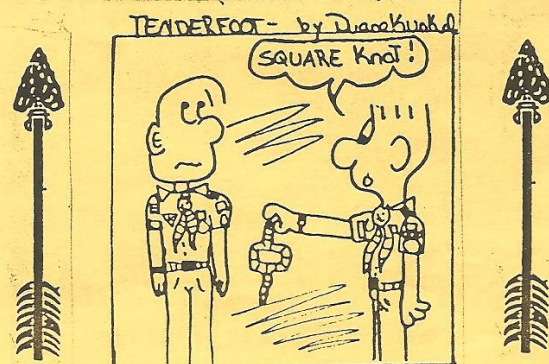

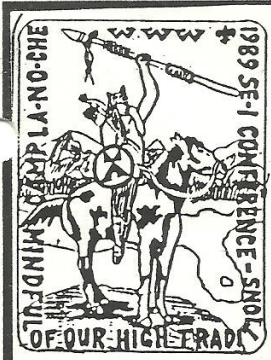

Indoor Competition Heats Up with King's Cup

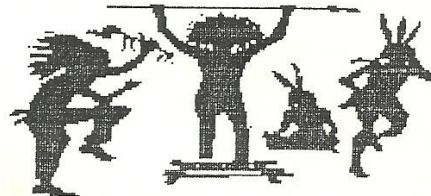

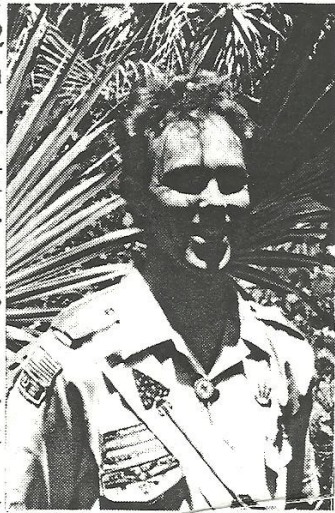
1989 SE-1 Section Conference Sees New Faces

ARE YOU THE LODGE CHIEF?

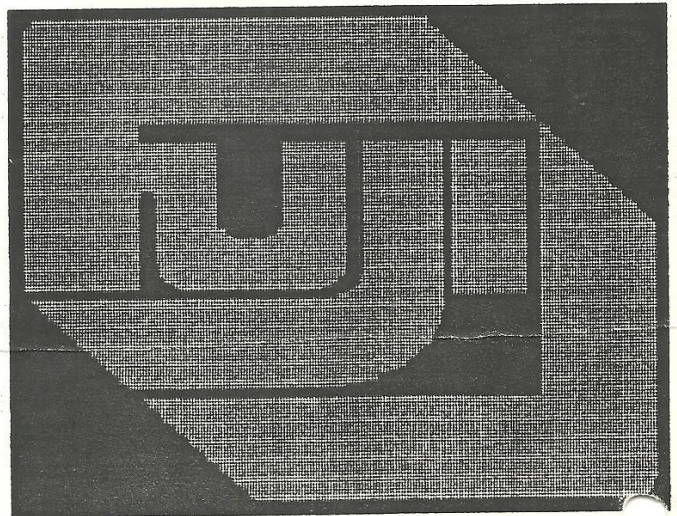

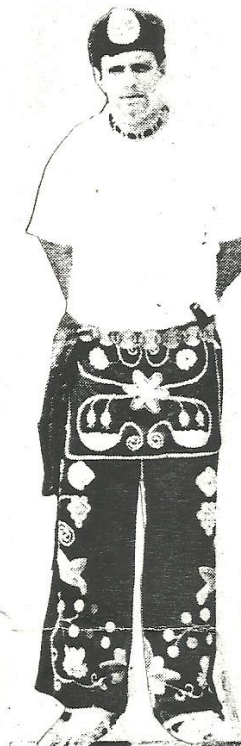
