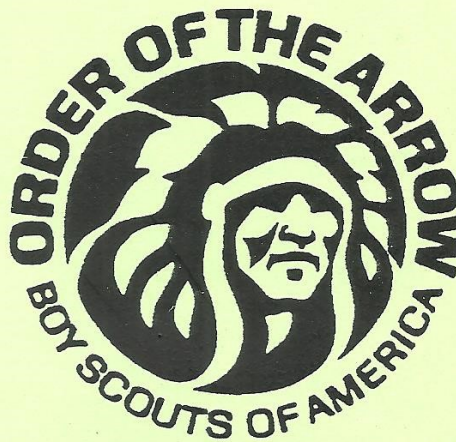

We hope that your visit here will be enjoyable and please contact any member of our Lodge if you have questions or if we can be of service in any way.

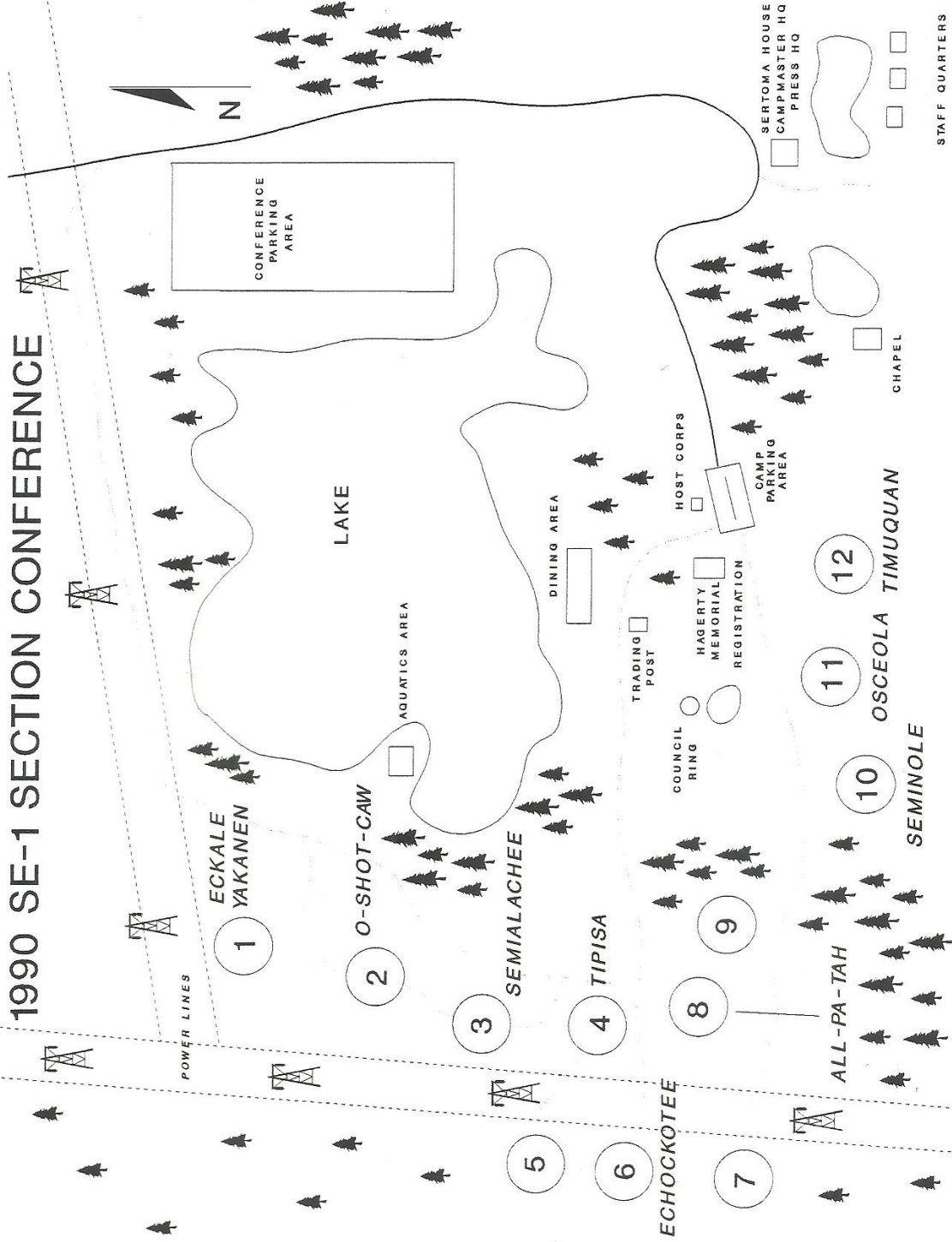

General Conference Information

Registration:

Friday night registration will take place in the assigned campsite for all pre-registrants. This will be handled by the Host Corps representatives in that site until 8:45 pm. Late registration will be handled at the Hagerty Memorial Shelter near the Camp parking lot on Friday night and at Conference H.Q. for the rest of the weekend. After Friday night all registration materials will be at Conference H.Q.

Late registration will be accepted after March 31, 1990, but no guarantee will be made for patches or other conference items nor will any refund of the fee be given if patches are not available. Late registration at the conference will only be accepted to the extent that food is available. Therefore pre-registration of additional spaces by Lodges is advisable. All materials for "Joe Arrowman" registrations will be turned over to the Lodge Chief or Adviser who will be responsible for delivering this material to the registrants. The host Lodge will be responsible only for registration materials for named registrants.

Registration will be available in the camp sites starting at 6:00 pm with early registration at the Hagerty Shelter between 4:00 and 5:30 pm.

Arrival and Departure:

There will be a large parking area just inside the gate where vehicles will be parked. Buses and vans will be sent to the camp parking lot to unload. Shuttles will be provided from both lots to take people and equipment to the campsites. No vehicles will be allowed in the site. Transportation will also be furnished for gear on Friday night and Sunday morning. Sand Hill is regularly patrolled by the Hernando County Sheriff's Office, however Timuquan Lodge and the West Central Florida Council will take no responsibility for the vehicles or property left in them.

Trading Post:

Section Conference material will be available in the Conference Trading Post. The items are: neckerchiefs, slides, mugs, T-shirts, patches, and hat pins. These were all available during pre-sale. A limited quantity will be available on a "first come-first serve" basis. Along with this booklet, you should have been issued a blue punch card which allows purchase of one each of the items (to the extent that they are available) until Saturday afternoon at 3:00 pm. At that time, the remaining items will go on unlimited sale. The punch cards will not guarantee the availability of the items. Only if you pre-purchased the items will you be guaranteed merchandise. We hope to have sufficient quantities on hand to fill orders.

There will be a grill operating during the conference. Soft drinks, ice cream, candy, popcorn, hamburgers, hot dogs, sausage, and whatever other junk food there is a market for will be sold from there. There will also be a Camp Trading Post (in addition to the Conference Trading Post) with various local souvenirs and National Supply items for sale.

Quest for the Golden Arrow

Events in the Quest are as follows:

Pie Eating Contest: This competition requires a hearty appetite and a quick mouth. There will be one entrant from each Lodge. The object of the contest is speed. The contestant who completely eats his pie in the shortest amount of time will be the winner of the event.

Making Tea and Toast while Experiencing the Unexpected: In this event, two members from each Lodge will attempt to make a slice of toast and a cup of tea while overcoming unexpected obstacles. The object is to make the toast and tea in the least amount of time.

A True Triathlon (Running, Swimming, and Bicycling): In this event, each Lodge will have three participants (one for each leg of the triathlon). The swimmers will begin, swimming a specified distance, at the end of which they will tag the cyclist. Since the bikes will be all-terrain, part of that section will be over rough ground. The cyclist will tag the runner, who in turn completes the event by running to the finish line. Best time wins the event.

A Nuclear Reactor: Four participants will each hold ropes that go through four pulleys in this event. The ropes will be attached to a pole that must be put into a hole using teamwork. An additional fifth participant may be used to lead the other four. Yet again, best time wins the event.

Coracle Race: Four participants in this competition will build a raft with one piece of plastic sheeting, and logs, sticks, etc., found on the shore. Upon completion of the coracle, one member of the team must paddle the structure on the water to a predetermined point while keeping it afloat. Once more, best time wins the event.

Backwards Canoe Race: In this event, the three participants must navigate their canoe along a course backwards. All three competitors must paddle, and for the last time (we promise), best time wins the event.

Tug-of-War: There will be two competitions: Senior and Junior. The competition will be held in a location which could cause the losing team to become somewhat untidy. Initial competition will be double elimination, but the final competition will be single elimination.

Senior Tug-of-War Competition: Each team may have up to 10 members. There is no weight limit. All participants must be youth.

Junior Tug-of-War Competition: Each team may not weight more than 1000 combined pounds (if that doesn't seem like a lot, think of it as half a ton). All participants must be youth.

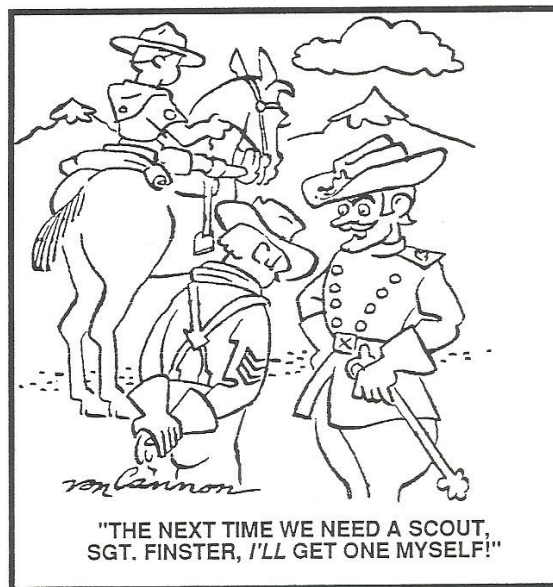
Scoring (not an event!!): Like last year's Quest, a first place finish earns one point, second place earns 2, and so on until the last team finishes the event. The Lodge with the lowest score wins. Any Lodge not competing will receive one point more than the team that actually finished last in that particular event.

Training Seminars

The following seminars will be conducted at the Conference:

1. **History of the Order of the Arrow:** a brief overview of the founding, organization, and evolution of the Order from the first days at Treasure Island to the 1990 Conference.
2. **History of the Order of the Arrow in Florida:** a history of the origins of OA in Florida and of Lodges and Conferences in the dim and not so dim past.
3. **The Adult Role in the OA:** The perennial favorite of all training conferences—how to keep the adults' fingers out of the Lodge business (the fine line between advising and dictating).
4. **The Role of the Individual in the Order:** The role of Unit service and service to others in the day to day life of all Arrowmen. An exchange of ideas for service between Lodges.
5. **Holding Effective and Successful Meetings:** How to keep things on track and moving. The development, planning, and execution of an "effective" meeting.
6. **The Transition from Ordeal to Brotherhood:** The role of the average lodge member in assisting new brothers to seal their membership.
7. **Maintaining a Safe Lodge Program and Risk Management:** How to run a safe program and avoid injuries that lead to lawsuits.
8. **Native American Singing:** An overview of the art of Northern and Southern style singing. Topics include drum etiquette and the various types and structures of songs. Seminar attendees are encouraged to participate in singing and drumming.

Each seminar is expected to last 25 minutes and start every 30 minutes. There will be a Best Trained Award given by the host Lodge at the Sunday business meeting for the lodge with the highest percentage of Arrowmen in attendance at the training seminars.



The Founder's Award

In 1981, the National Order of the Arrow Committee established the Founder's Award. The purpose of this award is to recognize those Arrowmen who memorialize the spirit of achievement as revealed to us by our Order's founders, Dr. E. Uner Goodman and Col. Carroll A. Edson. In the words of Dr. Goodman:

"The spirit, as I understand it, is the real self of the individual... helping him to do what he thinks he ought to do in the future. It is a thing that is hard to set forth in so many words, but it is facing life as we understand it and seeking guidance and help to do our best; and that is what I pray for in the years that are ahead for the Arrowmen as they face this future, feeling that God will help them to do that which our country needs, and do it with devotion in the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service."

The following Arrowmen of SE-1, whose service and example have been so exemplary as to require additional attention, have been presented with the Founder's Award:

SE-1 Past and Present

The Section known today as SE-1 has lived through many incarnations. In 1945, Area VI-E was established. The first Conference, or Area Meet as it was then called, was held at Camp Echockotee. The eight original members of Area VI-E were: Aal-Pa-Tah, Calusa, Echockotee, Kiondasha, O-Shot-Caw, Pilthanako, Semilachee, and Tipisa.

A number of changes took place during these early years. Kiondasha was renamed Seminole. Calusa Lodge was dropped and was later reorganized as Eckale-Yakanen. Pilthanako was moved to Area VI-C and later to Area VI-D. During the late 1940's Timuquan and Chiriqui Lodges were formed. At one time O-Shot-Caw was dropped, but later reformed with the same name in the mid 1950's. In 1968 Echockotee Lodge moved to Area VI-C and Osceola Lodge was formed.

In 1972, Aal-Pa-Tah hosted the final Area Meet at Camp Tanah-Keeta. In 1973, National reorganized the Areas into Sections. These Sections became the OA organization on the Area level. In 1973, Timuquan Lodge hosted the first SE-6 Section Conference at Camp Soule. As SE-6, the Section regained Echockotee. Also added were Yustaga Lodge from Alabama and Chiriqui Lodge in the Canal Zone.

Ten years later as part of another national reorganization our Section was changed from SE-6 to SE-1. Our first conference as SE-1 was held at Camp Soule in 1982. As part of this reorganization Yustaga was lost from the Section, leaving Echockotee, Timuquan, Tipisa, O-Shot-Caw, Aal-Pa-Tah, Eckale-Yakanen, Seminole, Semilachee, Osceola, and Chiriqui. In 1987 Chiriqui, which covered the Panama Canal Zone, was removed from our Section. Last year's conference was held at Camp Loxahatchee on the Tanah-Keeta Scout Reservation, and was the forty-third meeting of the Lodges of Florida.
