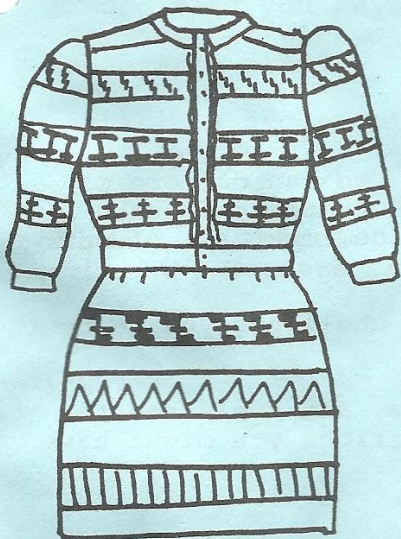

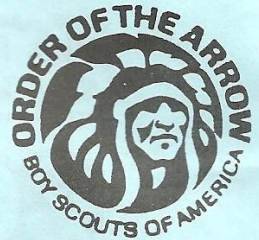

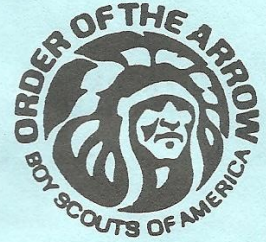

SE-1 PAST AND PRESENT

The Section known today as SE-1 has lived through many incarnations. In 1945, Area VI-E was established. The first Conference, or Area Meet as it was then called, was held at Camp Echockotee. The eight original members of Area VI-E were: Aal-Pa-Tah, Calusa, Echockotee, Kiondasha, O-Shot-Caw, Pilthanako, Semilacheem and Tipisa.

A number of changes took place during these early years. Kiondasha was renamed Seminole. Calusa Lodge was dropped and was later reorganized as Eckale-Yakanen. Pithanako was moved to Area VI-C and later VI-D. During the late 1940's Timiquan and Chiriqui Lodges were formed. At one time O-Shot-Caw was dropped, but later reformed with the same name in the mid 1950's. In 1968 Echockotee Lodge moved to Area VI-C and Osceola Lodge was formed.

In 1972, Aal-Pa-Tah hosted the final Area Meet at Camp Tanah-Keeta. In 1973, National reorganized the Areas into Sections. These Sections became the OA organization on the Area level. In 1973, Timiquan Lodge hosted the first SE-6 Section Conference at Camp Soule. As SE-6, the Section regained Echockotee. Also added were Yustage Lodge from Alabama and Chiriqui Lodge in the Canal Zone.

Ten years later as part of another national reorganization, our Section was changed from SE-6 to SE-1. Our first conference as SE-1 was held at Camp Soule in 1982. As part of this reorganization Yustage was lost from the Section, leaving Echockotee, Timiquan, Tipisa, O-Shot-Caw, Aal-Pa-Tah, Eckale-Yakanen, Seminole, Semilachee, Osceola, and Chiriqui. In 1987 Chiriqui, which covered the Panama Canal Zone, was removed from our Section. This year's conference, held at the Dr. Franklin Miles Camp in the Price-Sanders Scout Reservation will be the forty-sixth meeting of the Lodges of Florida.

TRAINING SEMINARS

The following seminars will be presented at the Conference. All seminars will be presented at the parade field and across the waterway.

1. **Effective Meetings**--How to keep things on track and moving. Development, planning, and execution of an "effective meeting" given by Section Historian Chip Borman.
2. **Lodge Planning**--Planning activities to keep your Lodge members active presented by Section Seminar Co-Chairman Chris Ham.
3. **Camp Promotions**--How to conduct summer camp promotion shows by Seminole Program Vice Chief David Hensarling.
4. **Seminole History**--Well known Seminole hobbyist and historian Rick Obermeyer will present this intriguing seminar on Seminole clothing and history. [1 HOUR SEMINAR]
5. **OA History in Florida**--A history of the origins of OA in Florida and of the Lodges and Conferences in the dim and not so dim history given by an expert in Florida OA, John Keatley.
6. **Explanation of the Ordeal**--What is the symbolism and meaning behind the Ordeal is presented by Clinton Scharff, Section Vice-Chief.
7. **OA at Summertime**--How the OA can be a benefit in summer camp programs.
8. **Elangomats**--Learn what they are and how they can improve Ordeals and membership retention by Tipisa Lodge's Elangomat Chief Greg Ferguson.
9. **History of the Eagle**--Terry Grove, Eagle Scout and collector of Eagle badges and awards, will be displaying and discussing his extensive collection.
10. **OA Organization**--How is the OA organized and how does it work. Scott Benfield, Echochotee Lodge Secretary will tell all.
11. **Ceremonies**--How to conduct effective ceremonies for any occasion.
12. **Dance**--Aaron Stanton & Zak Butler, Dance Team Chairmen for their lodges and Dance Champions, will be discussing the different forms of Indian dancing.

CONFERENCE TRAINING AWARD-- At each of the training sessions, pick up a 'training card'. Collect all four and purchase the Training Award pin which may be attached to your Conference patch. Redeem at Conference Trading Post. Write your lodge number on the cards as they will count toward the Best Trained Lodge Award.

QUEST FOR THE GOLDEN ARROW

Quest events are as follows. More complete rule will be given to each Lodge Chief.

AQUA NERDLING

5 participants from each lodge holds on to an oar with 1 hand while standing at the deep end of a pool. They alternate so that there are 3 on one side and 2 on the other. At the signal they enter the pool and swim to the other side, round a marker, and return to the starting point. If someone lets go, the group will stop and regain hold before continuing and receives a 10 second penalty. Fastest time wins. POOL

TRIATHLATHON

3 participants per lodge. Swimmer begins race in pool and passes the baton to the runner who will run the crosscountry track and pass the baton to the canoer. Best time wins. WATERFRONT.

OA BRAINBOWL

3 participants from each lodge will battle it out in a quizbowl game on facts taken from the Manual for the Ordeal, the OA Handbook, Boy Scout Handbook, and the Patrol Leader's Handbook. CHICKEE.

LODGE CHALLENGE

3 participants are issued a bowsaw and 2 lengths of rope. Their goal is to saw a stake placed firmly in the center of a 10 foot circle without entering the circle. Best time wins. BEHIND HEALTH LODGE.

FRICITION BRIDGE

6 members from each lodge must build a bridge a creek without using ropes. Logs will be supplied. Fastest time wins. DITCH BEHIND CHAPEL.

TUG OF WAR

Will be done in 2 groups. Competition will be double elimination with the finals being single elimination. Losing team may become a little wet and messy. BRIDGE.

Light Weight- team may weight no more than 1,000 pounds and have up to 10 youth members.

Heavy Weight- team may have up to 10 youth members with no limit.

ADULT SINK-A-THON (not determined in total Quest score)

Lodge Advisor and Lodge Staff Advisor will compete against the other lodges in a canoe sink-a-thon. A no. 10 can will be supplies. WEST WATERWAY.

SCORING

Each Lodge receives 1 point for first place, 2 for second, and so forth on to 8. Lowest score wins the Quest. If a lodge does not participate in an event they receive a score of 9. In case of a tie, the lodge with the most first places wins.

Trading Posts

Osceola Lodge will be running several different trading posts during the Conference. A camp trading post located in the camp trading post building will sell camp t-shirts, patches, and other standard camp supplies. In the back of the camp trading post building will be located the conference trading post. Arrowmen can pick up their pre-ordered conference supplies when this trading post is open. Identification (driver's license or Boy Scout registration card) will be required to pick up a pre-order. The Osceola Grill, operating near the porch of the trading post, will sell soft drinks, hot dogs, hamburgers, and other snacks.

The Conference trading post, operating out of the back of the trading post building, will sell the following Section Conference commemorative items: patch, backpatch, neckerchief, neckerchief slide, hat pin, mug, and t-shirt.

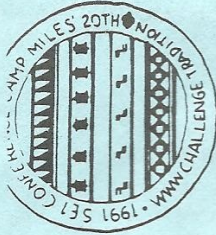
