### Security

he members of the security committee of the O-Shot-Caw Lodge have been assigned many different responsibilities. These include the administration of the First Aid Stations, Camp Security, Parking Organization, and the Shuttle service to and from the parking area.

The Security Committee has arranged for an Explorer Post to handle the two first aid stations located within the camp grounds. Each of the stations are located at opposite ends of Camp Seminole. The main First Aid Station is located between the O-Shot-Caw campsite and the pumphouse, the second station is located at Buzzard's Roost near the rear of Camp Seminole. First Aid will remain open 24 hours—a—day.

There will be various members of the committee patrolling the camp throughout the weekend to assure that the Conference is maintained safe. If for any reason a security representative is needed there will be one at both First Aid Stations for the duration of the Conference.

The parking area, located adjacent to Camp Seminole, will have some limitations to its access for safety purposes. The parking lot will be open from 7am to 11pm unless there is an emergency that requires access to the parking lot

after closing. No one will be allowed to enter or exit the parking area on foot. Everyone must use the Shuttle service in order to ensure safety throughout the Conference. The parking lot is for parking only—no one will be allowed to roam

the parking lot.

We will have a Shuttle service running throughout the Conference. On Saturday the Shuttle service will run from the entrance of Camp Seminole to the parking lot and from the rear of Camp Seminole to the parking lot. The Shuttle will be restricted to individuals going to the parking lot and leaving in the vehicles. No one is to ride the shuttle in order to site see—it will only be used by those individuals leaving camp in their vehicles.
