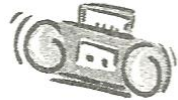

A. Crafts

Encourages lodges to incorporate Native American music into their Indian Events program.

F. Group Dance:



































Seminar Descriptions

All seminars will be held on or near the Activity Field and most are scheduled for 25-minute with five minutes between seminars for travel. Due to the volume of material covered in some seminars, there are a few sessions which will last 55 minutes rather than the standard 25 minutes allotted for most sessions. Seminars will occur from 11:00 am to 1:30 pm. Arrowmen may pick up their lunch during any one of the three middle sessions (11:30-1:00) on the Activity Field. All Arrowmen are encouraged to take their bag lunch to a seminar so that they do not miss out on any of the top quality training offered by our Section.

Native American Seminars

1. History of the Seminole

2. Lakota Story Telling

Hear stories of the Lakota Sioux from a traditional storyteller.

3. Native American Ladies' Clothing and Accessories

See the female aspect of Native American dance regalia.

4. Singing and Drumming: Northern and Southern

Require the basics of singing and drumming to begin or improve your lodge Indian events program.

5. Dance Styles and Regalia

See the correct outfitting for each style of Native American dance and learn the origins of modern dancing.

6. Lodge Raising

Take part in the practical and traditional methods used to erect an actual tipi.

A guide to equipping your dance or ceremonial team with authentic Southeastern clothing

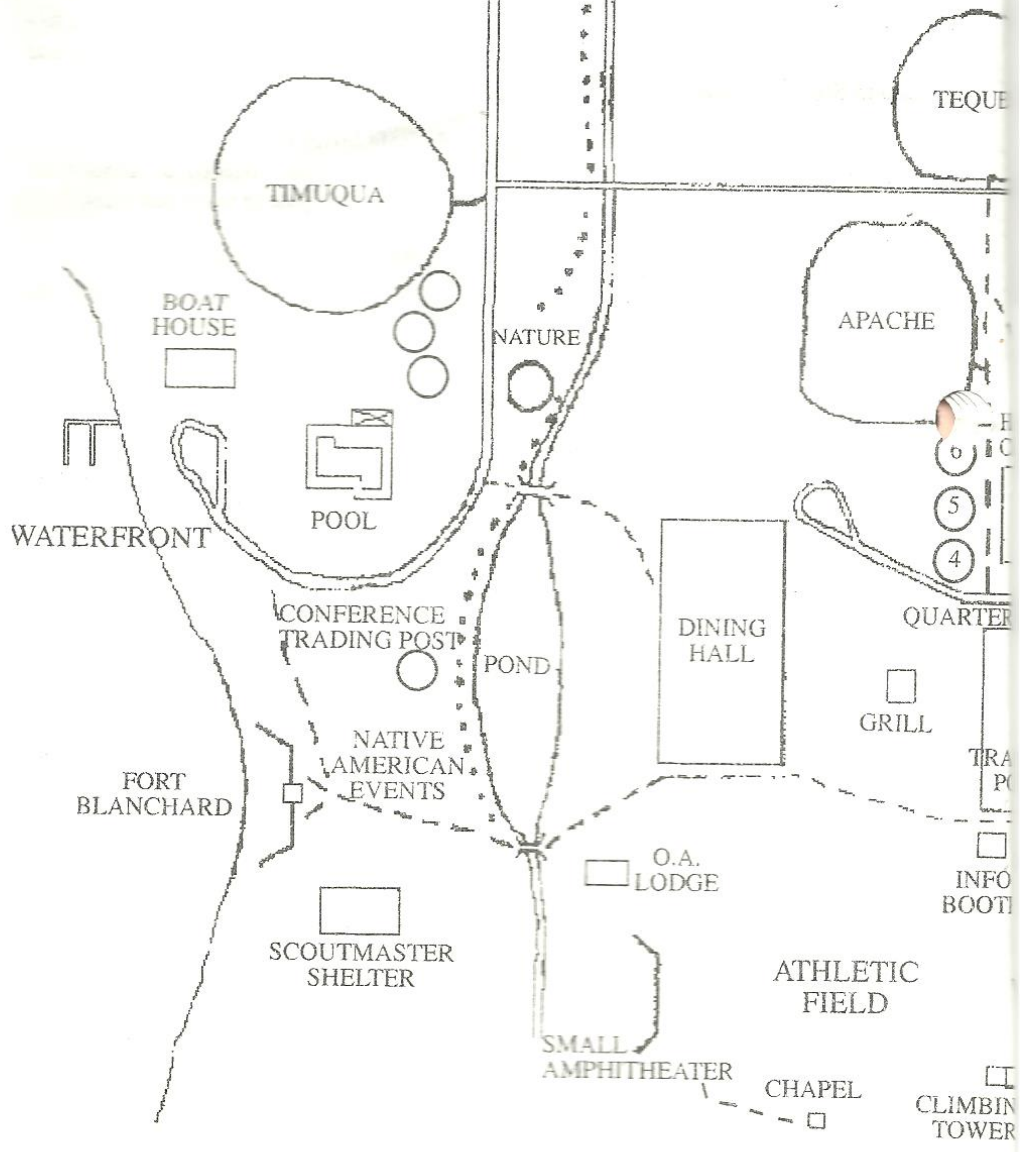

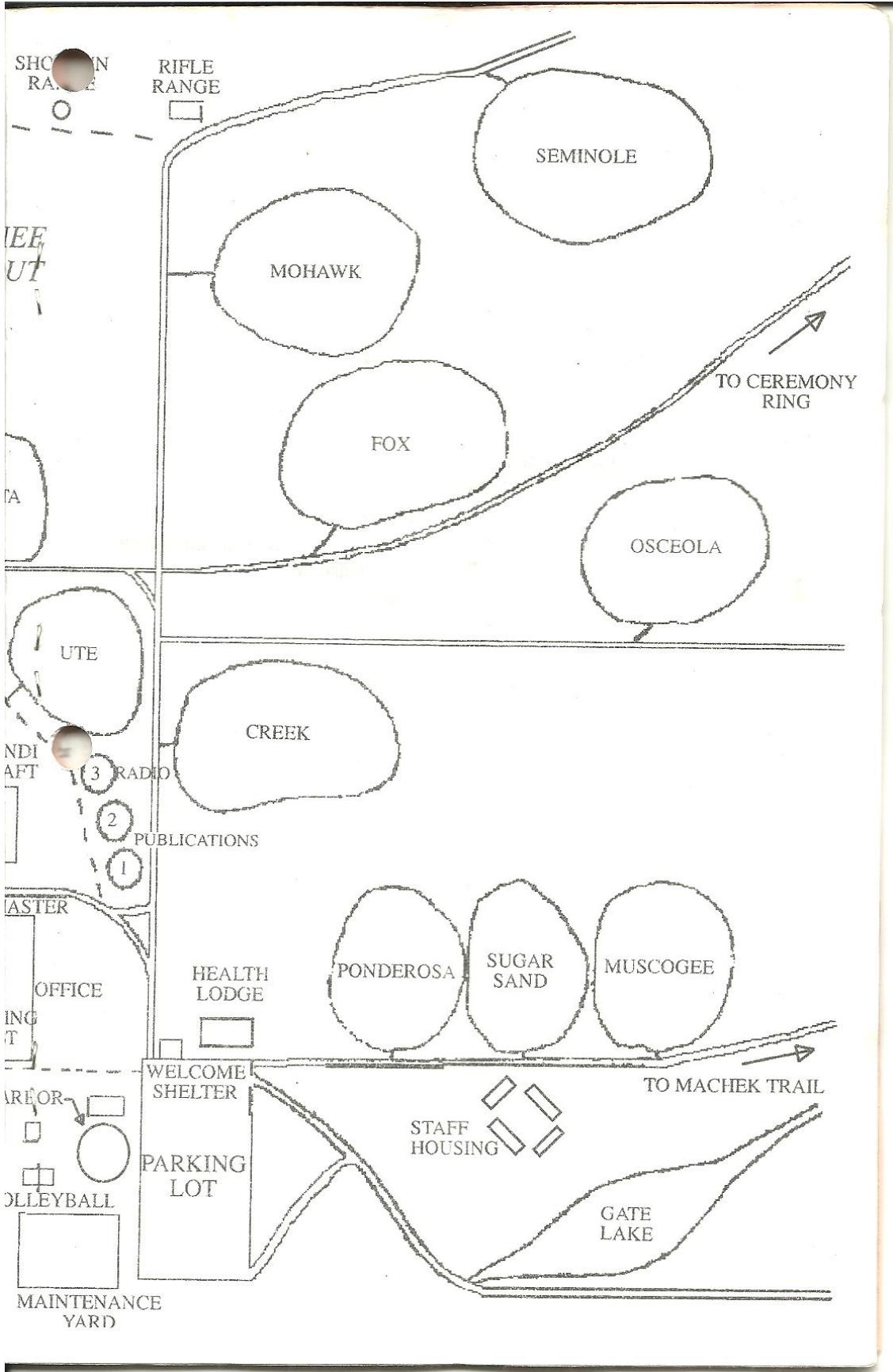

General Competitions

1. 5K Brotherhood Run

Awards will be given to both youth and adults who compete in this Saturday morning race.

2. Monopoly and RISK Tournaments

Individuals can gather each night to take part in a contest of wits and strategy.

3. S-4 Rock Climbing Competition

There will be several distinct climbs of varying difficulty set up on our climbing tower. This competition will be open Saturday afternoon for individuals to compete in. We will provide all necessary equipment.

4. Hidden Arrow

Somewhere in camp there is an arrow! Clues will be posted and given in the conference publications and at the Friday night show. The first person to decipher the clues and retrieve the arrow will receive a special gift.

5. Innertube Waterpolo

This event will be a single elimination tournament played by teams in the pool on Saturday afternoon. Players will participate in 12-minute games, trying to make goals while floating in inner-tubes.

6. Ceremonial Competition

Teams from each lodge perform the pre-ordeal ceremony. All arrowmen are welcome to view this competition.

6. S-4 Raft Race

Lodges competing in this event will be required to use their ingenuity to construct a raft to race on the Loxahatchee River. Teams will be restricted to using only provided materials.

7. Adult Sink-A-Thon

The Lodge Advisor and Staff Advisor must try to sink all of their opponents without going under.

8. Lodge Spirit Award

This award will be given out based on lodge involvement in all events and their spirit at these activities. This award is voted on by the host lodge.

9. Spirit of Meteu Award

This recognition will be given to the lodge who fulfills their pledge of reverence by having the largest percentage of members attending religious services.

10. Best Trained Lodge Award

The Lodge with the highest percentage of attendance at the seminars on Saturday will receive this award.

11. King's Cup

The King's Cup is awarded to the lodge with the best display showing both the lodge's past and present.

Quest for the Golden Arrow

1. O.A. Jeopardy

Teams will answer questions regarding our Section, NOAC, the OA, and general Scouting knowledge. The top three teams, each consisting of three people, will compete in a true Jeopardy tournament.

2. Triathlon Relay

Three arrowmen will compete in this event. The course will involve swimming, running, and archery skills to bring in the best time.

3. Nerdling

This is a timed event using five lodge members. They will run a designated course while all straddling at 10-ft long pole.

4. Fireman Relay

The three arrowmen competing in this event will have to put on fireman's gear, run while wearing it, and avoid obstacles transporting a fire hose to the finish line. This is a timed event.

5. Giant Connect Four

Four members of each Lodge will be placed on each side of a giant Connect Four Board. Each team will receive 10 frisbees which may be tossed into the game board until the lodge is able to connect four. This is a timed event.

6. Sand Ski Race

Arrowmen will test their coordination and cooperation by "skiing" through a course while standing on a set of wooden 4'x4' skis. The winner will be the lodge to complete the course the fastest.

7. Gatorwalk

One arrowmen will stand upon an upright A-frame while four others attempt to direct him across an area using guidewires. Winners will be based upon time and accomplishment of a specific objective.

The next two events have individual awards as well as being part of the Quest.

8. Volleyball

This single elimination tournament will pit eight members of each lodge against each other. Teams play up to fifteen and must win by a margin of two. The last two lodges will play a best-out-of-three match.

9. Tug-O-War

There will be two categories of competition: a 12 person team with no weight limit and a 1200 lb. limit.

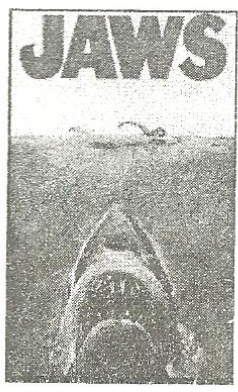
Active Arrowman Award

At the conclusion of each training seminar, Seminar Leaders will distribute a training token to each arrowman in attendance. Once you have received at least four tokens, please see your lodge chief who will collect your tokens and \$1.00. Your lodge chief will then turn all the tokens in to the Host Lodge so that the Best Trained Lodge can be determined. At that time, the lodge chief will receive his lodge's Active Arrowman Pins.

Dive-In Movie

This is a new twist on an old idea. Movies will be shown each night at the pool. You can choose to lounge the night away watching the movie while floating around the pool in your own innertube or if you prefer you can watch from the dry and safe bleachers.

The History of Section S-4

The Section known today as Southern Region Section Four has lived through many incarnations. In 1942, Area J of Region VI was established, and included the eleven existing lodges in Georgia, South Carolina, and most of Florida. By 1945, South Carolina and the lodges of northern Georgia were moved to Area Z. Also in 1945, the Area J lodges gathered for their first ever Fellowship Meeting at Camp Echokotee in the North Florida Council. The member lodges at that time were Seminole 85, Tomo Chi Chi 119 (Savannah, Georgia), Echokotee 200, Chattahoochee 204 (Columbus, Georgia), Calusa 219 (Bradenton, Florida), Chawtaw 229 (later Philthlako), Aal-Pa-Tah 237, Suriarco 239 (later Semialachee), O-Shot-Caw 265, and Wehadkee 273 (West Point, Georgia). This Area J Fellowship also saw members of the Tipisa Honor Camper Society go through their Ordeal. In 1947, Fielding Fry was elected as the first Area Chief.

In late 1949, Area J became Region VI Area D (or Simply Area VI D). It included Pilthlako 229 and all the Florida lodges except Yustaga 385. This arrangement lasted only until 1953 when the Areas were again reorganized. Area VI-E was created leading to the departure of Pilthlako 229 to Area VI-C and Semialachee to 239 to Area VI-D. O-Shot-Caw's charter lapsed, but the Lodge was rechartered in 1955 while that same year Calusa 219's final charter expired. Ordeals had always been conducted in conjunction with Area Conferences until the final Ordeal at the 1960 Conference. Eckale Yakanen 552 was chartered in 1961. In 1968, Echokotee was moved to Area VI-C. That same years, Osceola 564 was chartered.

The year 1972 saw the reorganization of the existing twelve regions into six. The new Southeast Region Section 6 (or SE-6), held its first Section Conference in 1973. Echokotee 200 and Semialachee 239 rejoined the lodges of peninsular Florida, and Yustaga 385 was also added. Chiriqui 391 from the Panama Canal Zone Council was a member of the section by this time. The first Section Seminars was held in 1975. The Southeast Region arranged the Sections in Late 1981 and Section SE-1 was formed. Yustaga 385 left the Section but otherwise the lodges remained the same. Later, in 1987, Chiriqui 391 became apart of the Direct Service Council and left the Section.

In 1992, the Region structure changed again, and six regions were compressed into four. This was the genesis of Southern Region Section Four (S-4) which combined nine lodges in pennisular Florida and three lodges in southern Georgia to form the best Section ever. Since then, Sunnyland Council has merged into Southwest Florida Council, causing the brothers of Osceola 564 and Eckale Yakanen 552 to come together and make a stronger Lodge than ever. These two geographic areas have not been united under a single Lodge since Calusa 219 disbanded in 1995.

The composition of the Section will change again this year as Tomo Chi Chi 119 (Savannah, Georgia) rejoins our Section along with newcomer Echeconnee 358 (Macon, Georgia). Both these lodges who were were recently a part of Section S-5 and are cheerfully welcomed to our circle of brotherhood.

During this year's Section Conference at Camp Tanah Keeta in Tequesta, Florida, the 51st meeting of the Lodges of Florida and South Georgia, may we be ever mindful of our history and traditions as we continue "On the Trail of the Arrow."
