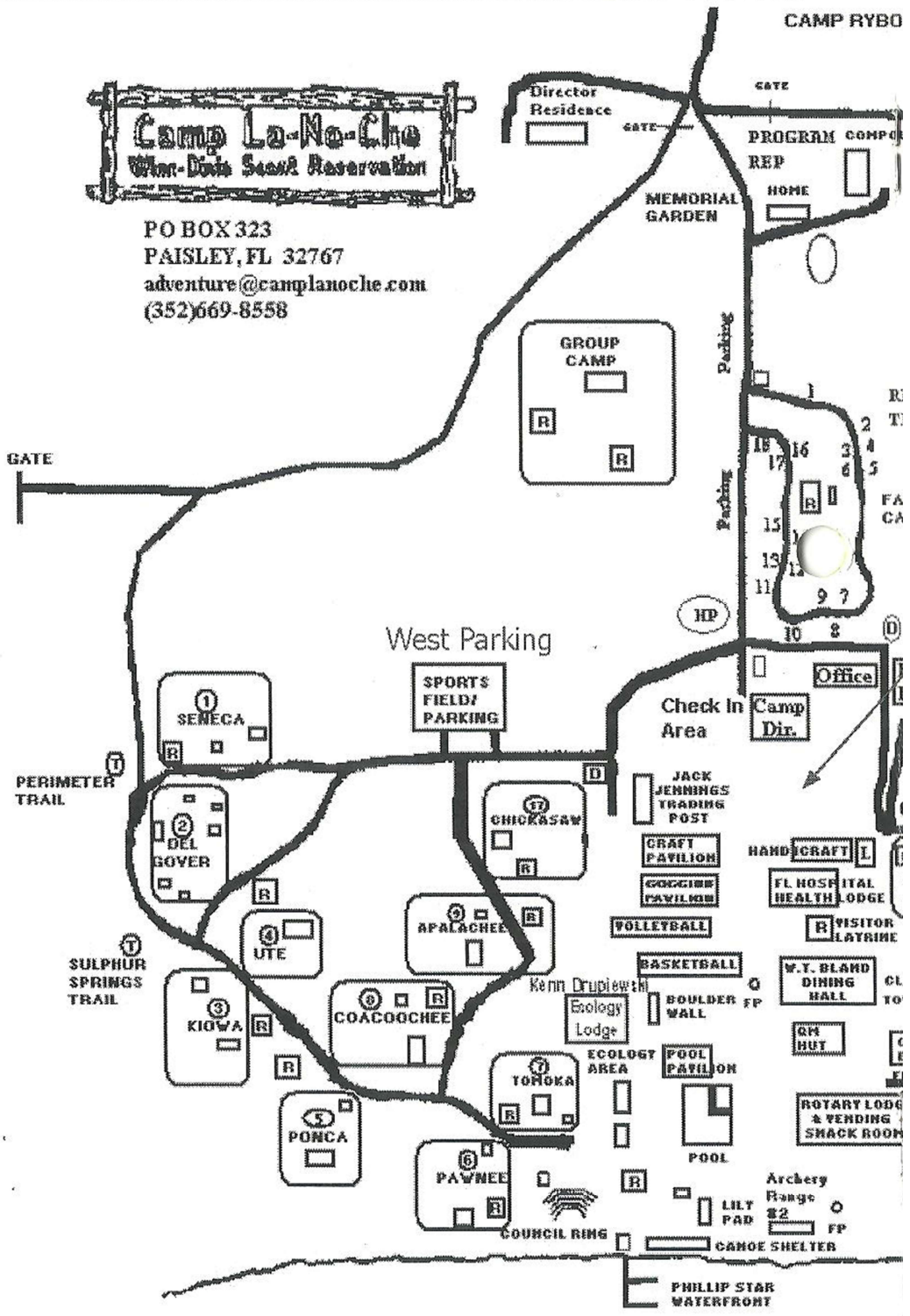

Map of Camp



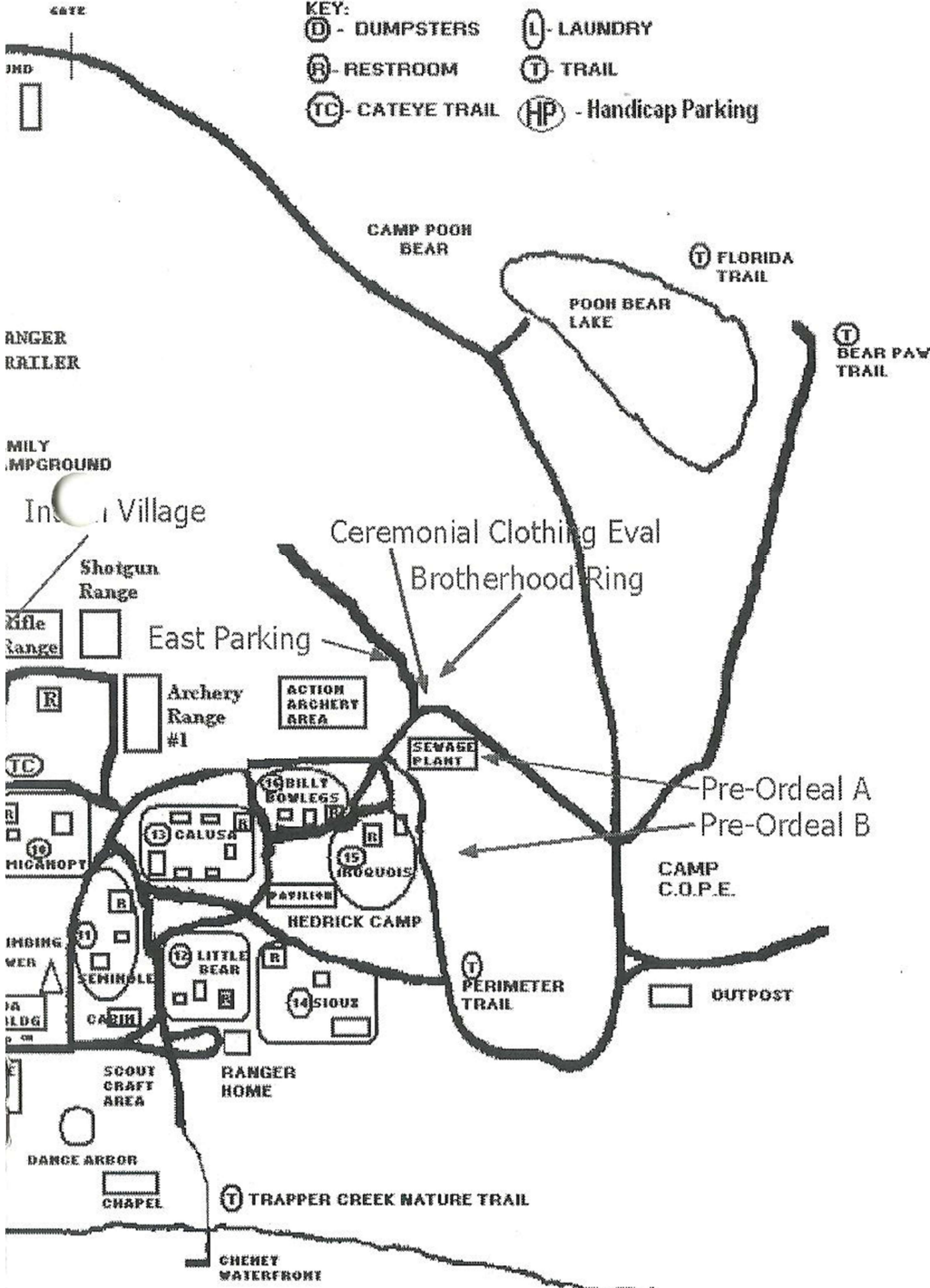

Special Events

Hidden Arrow: Clues in this booklet and weekend newspapers will lead you to arrows hidden in camp. Arrowmen can claim a prize by submitting discovered arrows to the Information Booth by 5:00PM Saturday.

Scavenger Hunt: Find as many items as possible from the list in this booklet. The lodge submitting the most items first to the Information Booth by 5:00PM Saturday, wins.

5K Run: Winning awards given to both Arrowmen and advisers. Meet near Handicap Parking (HP) at 6:00AM Saturday. How fast are you?

Active Arrowman Award: Earn this award while having fun! See back cover for details.

OA Jeopardy: Two-Arrowmen teams from each lodge will compete against each other at the Sports Pavilion during the Quest for the Golden Arrow by putting their knowledge of OA history to the test.

OA Grill: Tipisa's OA Grill, located behind the Dining Hall, will serve hot snacks and cool drinks from Friday at 3:00PM until Sunday at 1:00PM.

Quest for the Golden Arrow

Scoring for the Golden Arrow is given for lodges that place: 1st, 2nd, or 3rd. 1st place receives 1 point, 2nd place receives 2 points and so on. The lodge with the least amount of total points is the overall winner.

Nerdling: Six Arrowmen will maneuver through an obstacle course while holding a pole. Fastest time wins.

He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother: Seven Arrowmen will participate in a relay. Every brother must carry another across a fixed distance. Fastest time wins.

Ping Pong Ball Toss: Six Arrowmen will take turns throwing a ping pong ball. The lodge with the farthest accumulated distance wins.

Tarantula Race: Six Arrowmen will lock arms in a circle facing out. A leader in the group then must guide the group through an obstacle course. Fastest time wins.

Log Stand: Your lodge must retain as many Arrowmen as possible in a given space. The Arrowmen must hold themselves up for at least 20 seconds. The lodge with the most amount of Arrowmen in the space wins.

Seven-Legged Race: Six Arrowmen will be tied together at the ankle to form seven legs. The group will move across a fixed distance. Fastest time wins.

Active Arrowman Award

Complete the following requirements. Saturday morning events must be signed off by trainers or person conducting event. All other requirements must be signed off by Lodge Chief for youth awards or Lodge Adviser for adults. The Lodge Adviser is responsible for purchasing the Active Arrowman pins for Lodge members (\$1.00) at Saturday night CoC or Sunday breakfast.
