FACILITIES

At the Board Meeting on October 4, 1960 at Camp Tanah Keeta, President T. T. Reese, Jr. presided. Allan Markham presented a deed for an Outpost Camp at Fort Drum to the Council President. The property contains 9.45 acres and is deeded to the Gulf Stream Council by Mr. Richard Sudbrock (it seems Mr. Sudbrock's total acreage is 125 acres and he owns a gas station). Permanent corner markers have been installed and a well drilled on the property. It is to be kept as a wilderness camp. The Board formally accepted the property, which must be used at least once a year for a period of fifty years. At this time (1985), we are in the 25th year.

At the Board meeting of January 16, 1961, President Reese presented a certificate of appreciation to Mr. Richard Sudbrock, donor of the Wilderness Camp at Fort Drum. The Glades District announced they had installed a pump at Camp Sudbrock. Apparently, there was no consensus as to the camp name.

Mike Machek reported to the Board on May 15, 1961, that Troops #302 and #628 have helped to pour ten concrete platforms at Camp Tanah Keeta. Ten more will be poured one week from Saturday. Mr. Machek, Mr. Mims and Mr. Lanier all had their big boys at camp to help.

At Camp Tanah Keeta, on May 28, 1961, a report was made to the Board of plans to move the Scout Office to the new building. The office had been at 450 Datura Street, Room 9, West Palm Beach. Of the money raised to build the Scout Office, \$2,800 was borrowed to rebuild the dock at Camp Tanah Keeta and only a small amount has been replaced. There is not enough money to remodel the building, but plans are being made to have most of the material and labor donated. It is possible to have the office moved by July 30, 1961.

Craig Bell of the Container Corporation of America, delivered 15,000 pine seedlings to Camp Tanah Keeta on January 12, 1963. These had been requested by Paul Luce, District Executive, by letter dated August 16, 1962.

During the 1960's, Showando was held most every year at Camp Tanah Keeta, often in October, as it was in 1963 (October 12).

Webelos Camp was held on Saturday, November 2, 1963.

The Cub Pow Wow, for a number of years, was held at Palm Beach Junior College on Congress Avenue, usually in November.

Included with the minutes for the year 1965, was a letter to Clyde T. Ellis, Camping Chairman for the Council, from Mr. Louis Capron.* Louis Capron was a local writer and historian, especially of Florida and Indiana history. Mrs. Clara Capron was the Assistant Superintendent Of Schools for Instruction for many years. Mr. Capron's letter is an answer to Clyde Ellis' question about the meaning of the word "Tanah Keeta". Because of its general interest to Gulf Stream Council Scouters, the letter is included here.

* This letter was probably written in 1960 or earlier, while Clyde Ellis was Camping Chairman. Mike Machek, Peter Knoll, and Jamie Clemens were the three Camping Chairmen from 1961 to 1969.

In 1968, Camp Tanah Keeta received a grade of 89, a "B" rating, at its annual June inspection.

"CAMP TANAH KEETA"

Dear Mr. Ellis:

You have asked me about the name "Tanah Keeta" given in my Smithsonian paper on the Seminole Medicine Bundles and the Green Corn Dance. This name for the Green Corn Dance was given me by Sam Tommie in 1949, who gave its meaning as "All People Get Together". This is the Cow Creek version, and it is not too dissimilar to the Mikasuki, the latter being the other language spoken by the Florida Seminole. The name is appropriate, since the Green Corn Dance is the most important social and religious event of the year and everyone must attend. And it is the one that would be used all through this section and to the north, which is Cow Creek Country as opposed to Mikasuki country south of Lake Okeechobee.

This "Cow Creek" group speaks a definitely Creek dialect, as opposed to the Mikasuki, which is in the Hitchiti group. But they are not called Cow Creeks for this reason. They are Cow Creeks because from around 1870, their principal village was on Cow Creek in Okeechobee County. Strangely enough, the Creeks themselves got their name the same way. The British called them the "Creek Indians" because they lived in a part of Georgia where there were many creeks.

It's a happy choice of name that links a Boy Scout Camp to the great nature festival of our Florida Indians. The purpose of the Green Corn Dance is to promote the health and welfare of the Indians and so a Boy Scout Camp is to build strength, vigor and character by close contact with that great Medicine Man, Nature itself.

Jack Faircloth reported to the Board on January 25, 1971, that the Reader's Digest Boy Scouts of America Speaking Contest was held recently in Orlando, Florida and Kevin Nance from the Gulf Stream Council placed second in this area and was selected to make the Annual Report to the Governor.

Col. Ed Bailey, Chairman of the Eagle Recognition Banquet for the past eleven years, announced that the 1971 Banquet was held at the Breakers Hotel in Palm Beach. Twenty-one Eagle Scouts were recognized at that time. Art Anderson was Finance Chairman for the Banquet.

The World Jamboree will be held in Japan in August of 1971.

At the October 30, 1972 meeting of the Council Board, it was announced that in 1973, the Jamboree East would be held at Moraine State Park, PA, August 3 to 9. Jamboree West would be held at Farragut, Idaho, August 1 to 7.

At the Annual Business Meeting on November 27, 1972, Joe Nelson reported that this was the fourth season for the one-half hour "Scouts in Action" TV Show.

It was reported that the Council Fall Camporee was held at Fish-eating Creek with Scouter Bob Fincannon as General Chairman. This was an outstanding and successful camporee.

Charles Potter reports that "Thanks to Lester Stambaugh and his Eagle Scout son, Tim, Gold Coast District has an emblem ready for reproduction on patches and cups."

On June 25, 1973 at the Executive Board Meeting, Mark Ballard, a Scout from Troop 132 of the Trinity Methodist Church of Palm Beach Gardens, lit candles in a ceremony during which the "Key 3" accepted the Fall Roundup Goals. The challenge was accepted for Tom Rossin, President by Britton Sayles; Ray Weaver - Commissioner; and John Vantrease - Scout Executive. Royal Firman, Vice-President, presented a certificate to each as they pledged "On My Honor I Will Do My Best." A schedule for the Roundup was distributed.

The Annual Scout Show was called "EXPO 73" and was held in the West Palm Beach Auditorium. Ray Accetta was Chairman and the attendance was the largest to see a local Scout Show. Tim Stambaugh was presented a \$50 Savings Bond for designing the winning Council strip.

Mr. Vantrease presented to Chairmen of each District the \$50.00 prize for the troop winning the Scout Show ticket sales. He also presented the \$300.00 Council prize. The winning troops for each District are: Palm Beach District - Pack 100, J. T. Adams, Cubmaster; Gold Coast District - Troop 249, Richard Allard, Scoutmaster; Pioneer District - Troop 301, Anthony Depta, Scoutmaster; Treasure Coast District - Pack 499, Tom Hillegas, Cubmaster; Indian River District - Troop 598, J. H. Simmons, Scoutmaster; Glades District - Troop 621, Bob Fincannon, Scoutmaster; Sailfish District - Troop 815, Doug Arnold, Scoutmaster. For the Council Winner - Sailfish District, Troop 815, Doug Arnold, Scoutmaster.

The Council Jamboree was held at Lake Catherine in Palm Beach Gardens on October 26 to 28, 1973. Clay Olesen was the Chairman. The largest Cub, Scout and adult participation in a council jamboree to date.

At the Council Coordinated Committee Meeting on February 25, 1974, Eagle Scout Kenneth Kirby led the Pledge to the Flag and then expressed his appreciation to the Council and committee members for making it possible for him to become an Eagle Scout.

Ray Accetta reported that the Council Camporee, which was held at Okeeheelee Park on October 25 to 27, 1974, had more than 1,200 boys in 66 units participate in a wide variety of activities.

Clyde Dickens, Camporee Chief, is to be commended for an outstanding job.

Trent Steele of Explorer Post 163, represented the Gulf Stream Council at the Regional Contest in Atlanta, GA.

O'CONNELL in the above undertaking, and does hereby recognize and thank him for his worthy efforts on behalf of our organization.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this organization and that a copy be sent to each of the other charitable beneficiaries and that a copy be sent to the HONORABLE PHIL D. O'CONNELL, to make him aware that his community and public service is a lasting contribution to the betterment of the GULF STREAM COUNCIL and the young men of our area now and in the future, who will be able to participate in the activities of the BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA in part, on account of the efforts of the HONORABLE PHIL D. A SCOUTING TALE

Edwin Colean was born in Tampa, Florida, but moved to Viren, Illinois at age two. He became a Boy Scout there and during World War I, his Troop sold many War Bonds. General John Pershing and President Theodore Roosevelt, on a War Bond Tour, came by train to Virden, Illinois in 1917 and presented each Scout with a copy of the 15th edition of the Scout Manual. Edwin was so excited that he forgot which of the two great men presented him the manual. In 1925, he came to Fort Pierce, Florida and continued his interest in Scouting.

Sometime in the 1930's, he told his wife and daughter of losing his Post Office Box key and now mail was disappearing from his Post Office Box. The Postmaster Charles Peters arranged for surveillance. A twelve year old boy was caught with the key and some mail. Edwin Colean and Charles Peters discovered that the boy's parents were deceased and he lived with an elderly grandmother. They got him into Scouting and furnished him with a uniform, manual, etc. The lad turned out fine and became a solid citizen in the community.

Edwin Colean served on the Council Board and some years later, on May 18, 1979, presented his prized Scout Manual to his grandson, William Howard Minton, when he became a Boy Scout.

Edwin Minton, William's father and Edwin Colean's son-in-law, was a Boy Scout in Fort Pierce. He was one of a group of Scouts who presented a fire-building demonstration to Edwin Colean's Rotary Club. Mr. Colean was much impressed but had no idea that one of those Scouts would later be his son-in-law and eventually serve on the Board of the Gulf Stream Council.

ADMINISTRATION

Council Presidents were H. Milton Link (1970-72); Thomas E. Rossin (1973-75); Jamie C. Clemens (1976-77); Dr. Harold C. Manor (1978-81). Milton Link announced at the June 26, 1972 Board Meeting, that he was moving to Naples, Florida and must resign for that reason. He would continue, until replaced, until the time of actual moving.

Districts were listed as Palm Beach, Pioneer, Treasure Coast, Indian River, Glades and Sailfish, in 1970. In 1971, the North Star District was added. In 1972, the Gold Coast District was added. The North Star District was eliminated in 1973. In 1976, the Seminole District replaced the Gold Coast District and the Pioneer District was discontinued, ending the decade with six districts: Palm Beach, Seminole, Treasure Coast, Indian River, Sailfish, and Glades.

A Long Range Plan Study was conducted over the period 1959 to 1969, according to Scout Executive C. H. Gaskins. It was to project the growth and needs of the Council for twenty years. The study involved more than thirty community leaders from the seven county area of the Council. Membership, Organization and Manpower, Office Facilities and

Camp needs were to be projected. At the Board Meeting of October 27, 1969, Bruce Rumph, Chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee reported that all committees were about to compile their work and full reports would be available to the Board in January. There is no record of the Board receiving the final report, however, a copy of this Long Range Plan is on file in the Council office. The committee members were: Bruce Rumph, Chairman; Membership Committee - Waldo Daniels, Chairman, Al Butterfield, Leo Schmidt and James Bower; Office Study Committee - William Dannahower, Chairman, Sheppard Lesser, Jack Williams and Dr. J. P. Callaghan; Organization and Extension Committee - Vern Jaramillo, Chairman, Jim Smith and Bruce Rumph; Finance Committee - Joe Shearhouse, Chairman, Milton Link, Jack Williams, Randy Pinder, Ray Hatton, Bill Miller, Carlton Lucius, Richard Johnson and John Boy; Camp Development - William Walton, Chairman, Russ Gilbert, Bill Tydings, T. T. Reese, Carroll Peacock, Robert Voyles, Fred DeHon, Tex Reardon and Cecil Finch.

Enrollment was projected to be 9,441 boys by the end of 1976. The recommendations included a Field Director to assist the Scout Executive and adding one clerk in January, 1970. Also, the study recommended the Finance Chairman should have five Vice Chairmen as follows: Vice Chairman for Sustaining Membership Enrollment, Vice Chairman for Trusts - Wills and Bequests, Vice Chairman for Foundations, Vice Chairman for Budget and Finance, and Vice Chairman for Capital Funds.

Recommendations included a Council Service Center of adequate size, the sale of Camp Frederick Small, an increase in professional staff and further development of Camp Tanah Keeta.

At its meeting February 28, 1972, the Board passed a resolution of "affirmative action", reaffirming our local Council's position of non-discrimination.

In 1978, a new Long Range Plan was begun with Ray Weaver, Chairman. The plan was approved by the Council Board as a guide for development based on the projections made in the plan. The plan reviewed the population growth from 1970 and the growth record of units, youth and staff from 1970. Based upon general population and school population figures, projections were made for each District and the Council as a

whole for the years 1979 to 1983. The study projected leaders to be trained, quality items to be achieved, units and youth in camp, and staff needs.

In 1979, the Gulf Stream Council changed to a comprehensive budget accounting and report. Expenditures now show all receipts and expenditures for summer camp, many Council activities, and Council store operation. Previously, only net income or loss from these operations were shown in the Council budget, although full accounted for in auxilliary records. This accounts for the apparent major increase in expenditures shown for all years following 1978.

On July 8, 1971, at the Council Board meeting, paragraphs 7 and 9 of the Trust Agreement were amended (see minutes for details). An Additional amendment was passed on July 26, 1971 "that the power to amend or modify the Trust Agreement becomes that of the Council, rather than the trustees.....". It was unanimously approved.

It had been evident to the Board that Camp Tanah Keeta needed a great deal of development and that the Council needed a larger and adequate Service Center. It was decided to conduct a feasibility study to look into the probability of a capital campaign. Tom Whittingslow from the National Scout Office conducted the study from October of 1973 through January 1974.

On June 23, 1975, Tom Whittingslow, Director of Development on the National B.S.A. Staff, presented a contract to the Board for consideration. One of the provisions was that of engaging a member of the National staff to conduct the campaign.

At the meeting on July 28, 1975, Mr. Lane Baker from the National staff reviewed the "Case for Support" of the Capital Campaign.

Don Fifield, Regional Director, was in attendance at this meeting. Mr. Baker's services would be furnished by the National Office, for which our Council would pay \$50,000.

A motion was passed for the Council to conduct a Capital Campaign to raise \$829,000.

At the Executive Board meeting March 25, 1974, Tom Whittingslow reported on his study. He stated that there were 93 valid interviews made, including 19 members of the Board. He stated that \$1,500,000 should be raised for Camp development and a service center.

The campaign was conducted through 1976 and about \$600,000 was pledged toward the goal of \$829,000 as of June 1, 1976. Dr. Harold C. Manor was Chairman of the Steering Committee and James Kimberly was General Campaign Chairman. The campaign did not reach its goal but some important needs were met with the funds raised.

FACILITIES

The sale of Camp Small was discussed at the Executive Board meeting of April 6, 1970. Bruce H. Rumph asked Thomas Rossin to report on recent appraisals for the property. Mr. Nat Orr appraised the property at \$4,000 to \$5,000 per acre and stated that \$290,000 was a good price for the property. An oral appraisal was also obtained from Jim Sebrich, who said the property might go for as high as \$6,000 to \$8,000 per acre. Mr. Rossin thought the value might be somewhere between these values. Mr. Rumph stated that John D. MacArthur (Royal American Industries) had offered a cash sum of \$290,000.00 plus a piece of property for development of a new service center for the Camp Small property. Mr. Rumph moved the offer be accepted. After much discussion, the motion was tabled until the next regular meeting. At the Annual Business Meeting of the Council on December 14, 1970, Tom Rossin reported on the Camp Small property. Royal American Industries has made an offer to purchase and we have the contract in hand. The purchase price is \$375,000.00, or \$7,500 per acre. He stated that a brokerage fee of \$37,500.00 was to be paid and the Council would net \$337,500.00. The motion to adopt the resolution to approve the contract and that the appropriate officers be empowered to execute the sale was made by Bill Dannahower and seconded by Charles Becht, Cliff Dyson,

Tom Rossin and Joe Shearouse. The motion carried by a vote of 29 to 3, however one of the three nays was not a Board member.

A contract for the sale of Camp Small was approved by the Council Board on December 14, 1970 and signed on December 18, 1970. The Council received \$375,000 from Royal American Industries, \$125,000 in cash and \$250,000 to be paid over a period of five years at 8 percent interest. The commission, \$37,500, was paid by the Council to Kenneth Foster, realtor.

At the Board meeting on February 24, 1975, a full discussion was held on the proposal to purchase a building at 2935 Australian Avenue in West Palm Beach owned by the Perini Company as a Scout Service Center. A resolution was passed authorizing the Board to proceed with the purchase at a price not to exceed \$110,000. \$50,000 would be paid from funds received from the sale of Camp Small and \$60,000 from Trust Funds. The deed is dated March 13, 1975.

In May of 1975, the staff moved into the new Council headquarters.

Board minutes of September 22, 1975, state that the old Scout Office at the corner of Spruce and 53rd Sts., in West Palm Beach, was sold for approximately \$17,000 and the money has been deposited in the Trust Fund.

In June of 1970, Jack Oldham was employed as the first full-time Camp Ranger at Camp Tanah Keeta at a salary of \$5,200 per year.

In 1971, William "Bill" Walton, Chairman of the Camping Committee, is working to have latrines built at the new camp sites.

On May 10, 1978, bids were opened for the construction of the extension of the Dining Hall at Camp Tanah Keeta. The contract was awarded to the low bidder, Booth Construction Company, for approximately \$99,000, including alternates #1, #2, and #3. Rudy Arsenicos recommended the Board award the contract. The motion was made and passed.

Camp Oklawaha, a 65 acre rustic camp, is located near Sebastian with frontage on the Sebastian River. Formerly owned by an unofficial group known as "Indian River Scouters, Inc.", they deeded the land to the Gulf Stream Council in April, 1978.

PROGRAM

ACTIVITIES

The Gulf Stream Council was allocated three troops for the National Jamboree in 1981.

The Council Camporee for 1981 was held March 20 to 22, Vice President for Program Dr. Thomas Sturrock reported to the Board at its meeting on March 12, 1981.

Five Scout-O-Ramas were held simultaneously for the first time on May 9, 1981.

At its meeting October 19, 1981, the Council Board received a report that 51 Packs were represented at the two Pow Wows with a total of 210 leaders. Twenty staff members conducted the course. Mike Bartlett, District Executive, and Roberta Stetson, volunteer, were Chairpersons.

Junior Leader Training was conducted for 114 Scouts, divided into five troops with 44 staff members conducting the course.

Mike Machek, Jr., directs the Wood Badge Course.

On November 15, 1982, at the Annual Business Meeting of the Council, a report was made that approximately 1,500 Scouts and leaders in 60 troops attended Summer Camp. Another 2,000 used the Scout Reservation during the year.

The Junior Leader Training Course graduated 179 Scouts and a new advanced course was added this year. Thirty-three participated in the Wood Badge Course.

The Scout-O-Rama of 1982 had 136 units participate and 42,000 tickets were sold.

Several Cub Packs and Boy Scout Troops have been organized for exceptional children. A special day is held at Tanah Keeta each year for these "special needs Scouts". These events, which were held for the first time in 1980, are co-sponsored by area Kiwanis Clubs.

At the Council's Annual Business Meeting on November 21, 1983, it was reported that 62 troops and 1,096 Scouts participated in Summer Camp. There were 4,292 camper nights spent at Camp Tanah Keeta during the rest of the year. In addition, there were 1,544 camp users who did not stay over night.

There were 39 canoe trips made on the Loxahatchee River during the year.

There were seven Cub Day Camps in which 56 Packs and 678 Cub Scouts participated. Two Lad-Dad Weekends were conducted with a total of 572 Webelos Scouts in attendance. The Annual Spring Camp-eree had 1,216 attend in March.

A contingent of 17 young men and four leaders participated in a High Adventure to the Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base in Minnesota and Canada. A group of Explorers spent a weekend at the Florida Gateway High Adventure Base in the Keys.

The Gulf Stream Council was represented at the Fifteenth World Jamboree in Canada, by 9 Scouts and 2 contingent leaders. In addition, six staff members were furnished by the Gulf Stream Council in 1983.

An Indian Dance Team from Post 126, West Palm Beach, was invited to appear in the opening Arena Show. Twenty-five other members of the Council served in various positions at the Jamboree.

The 60th Anniversary, the Diamond Jubilee, of the chartering of the Gulf Stream Council by the Boy Scouts of America was celebrated with a Distinguished Citizens Award Dinner at the Hyatt of the Palm

Beaches on December 1, 1982 honoring three outstanding Scouters who helped the Council acquire Tanah Keeta Scout Reservation and who have been leaders and very supportive of Scouting in the Gulf Stream Council. The three Scouters are: E. V. "Jack" Faircloth, Phillip D. O'Connell, Sr., and Harry "Pop" Johnston. Jack Nicklaus was Honorary Chairman of the Dinner Steering Committee, with Council President Charles Potter and Phillip O'Connell, Jr. as Co-Chairmen. The tickets were \$60 per person and the proceeds from the dinner were used for improvements at Camp Tanah Keeta.

In 1982, 37 young men and 5 adult leaders made a High Adventure Trek to Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico for a backpacking adventure on the trail. They were to leave Camp Tanah Keeta on July 24 and return on August 11. The estimated cost per Scout is \$650.

Edwin Minton reported at the Executive Board Meeting of July 10, 1983 that eight adults and nine Scouts attended the World Jamboree in Alberta, Canada. Six of the adults, including Edwin Minton, served on the Jamboree staff.

Explorer Vice-President Larry Boyden reported that the Explorer President's Association was planning a trip to the Boy Scouts of America Sea Base in the Florida Keys, on October 8, 1983.

Groups from the Gulf Stream Council were planning to go to the Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base in Minnesota in 1983.

Eagle Scout Todd Clark was selected in 1983 at Dallas, Texas from six Eagle Scouts representing the Six Regions. Todd will be one of four Scouts making the Annual Report to President Ronald Reagan in February, 1984. He will also participate in other activities at the Capital at this time.

6. Evaluate the need for redistricting within Palm Beach County.
7. Establish new sources of income and expand existing ones.
8. Produce a Long Range Plan for 5 - 15 years for the Council's major properties.
9. Create permanent public relations and Chartered Partner committees at the Council level.

The study projected that the youth total membership would be 10,186 by the end of 1986. By the end of 1985, the total membership is expected to be in excess of 9,000.

On July 18, 1983, Larry Boyden, Vice-President for Exploring, made a report on exploring to the Board and moved that the Council approve the formation of Career Awareness Explorer Posts within the Council territory under the direction of the Exploring Vice-President. The motion passed, beginning the Career Awareness Program in the Gulf Stream Council.

Varsity Scouting began in the Gulf Stream Council in 1985.

At the Executive Board meeting of March 12, 1981 Vice-President for Finance Jack Hughes recommended that the Council employ a part-time Endowment Fund Development officer for the period of one year with a salary not to exceed \$6,000. Robert Bauer was employed for this position.

At its meeting on May 18, 1981 Vice-President Donald Sasser informed the board that the Council will receive approximately \$50,000 from the Faulkner Estate.

Robert C. Fitzpatrick of the First Marine Bank notified the Council by letter on August 27, 1982 that it will be a beneficiary of 10 percent of the Uno Nurmio Estate. This will probably be in excess of \$50,000 with the anticipated distribution projected to be in about six months.

Arnold M. Bauer, the first Scoutmaster in Martin County, died July 17, 1985. Prior to that time he had named the Gulf Stream Council as one of three beneficiaries of trust valued at approximately \$2,500,000. This will provide in excess of \$66,000 annually to the Council.

After considerable study, the Executive Board began a Capital Fund Campaign in 1985. A development firm, James K. Tonrey Associates, was given a contract to conduct the campaign and Mr. Jim Colvert was assigned to the task. The goal was set at \$1,504,000 to achieve the

it was divided into three phases. The goal for 1985 was set at \$750,000, 1986 at \$360,000 and 1987 at \$406,000 and added to that was \$38,000 in Endowment Revenue making the total \$1,504,000. As of October 30, 1985, a total of \$761,913 was pledged in 1985. The Sustaining Membership Enrollment was included in the campaign for 1985. In 1986 and 1987 the Sustaining Membership Enrollment will be conducted separately, although some SME Funds for 1986 and 1987 were included in pledges made in 1985, which were to be paid over a three year period.

A very special expression of appreciation is given to the Community Chests of Hobe Sound, Delray Beach, Palm Beach and the United Funds/Ways of Indian River County, St. Lucie County, Martin County, Palm Beach County and Greater Boca Raton, their officers and staffs who have worked so closely with the Gulf Stream Council from their beginning. Approximately thirty-seven percent of the Council operating budget, at this time, comes from these organizations. No history of the Gulf Stream Council would be complete without recognizing this major contribution to the Scouting program. Both the youth served and the adult volunteers join the professional staff in thanking the many volunteers who make these organizations possible. Without this support the fine Scouting program now available would be impossible to implement.

Camp Tanah Keeta received an "A" rating in 1980, with 100 percent grades in all areas. Camping was not limited to Summer Camp as over 800 Cubs attended the seven Day Camps held during 1980.

Rates for using Camp Tanah Keeta facilities were revised and the revised fees were approved April 20, 1981. Use of canoes, tents, cots, and a camp fee were established for periods other than Summer Camp.

In 1981, Camp Tanah Keeta received an "A" rating and over 1,100 Scouts and leaders attended Summer Camp. Webelos had two three-day camps at Camp Tanah Keeta in 1981.

Camp Tanah Keeta received an "A" rating in 1982 and again in 1983, for the sixth consecutive year. It also received "A" rating in 1984 and 1985.

As a result of the Capital Campaign, a donation of over \$40,000 by Mrs Dorothy Campbell for the Bathhouse in memory of her son Tim, and donations of material and labor, the Aquatic Center was opened for Summer Camp in 1985. The formal dedication of the center was held on Saturday, September 14, 1985. The program was opened with a Welcome by President Chuck Potter; Invocation by Roy Rood; Introductions by Chuck Potter; Fill-The-Pool Ceremony by Douglas Johansen; Remarks by Richard Paul, Area One Chairman; Special Recognitions by Bob Somers, Area One Director; and Closing by Ben Edwards, Scout Executive. Special thanks were given to Mrs. Campbell; Mr. Joe Barrow of Barrow Pools; Mr. Bill Curtis, Carlton Engineers; Mr. Paul Schofield, Shalloway Engineers; Mr. Charles Adams, South Palm Construction; Mr. Chuck Hardy of Palmer-Hardy Electric; and Mr. Roy Rood, Rood Landscaping.

Contributions were collected during 1983-84 and 85 for an All Faiths Chapel at Camp Tanah Keeta. Ray L. Weaver was Chairman for the project. The Executive Board decided to name the Chapel the Ray and Kay Weaver Chapel. The Chapel was constructed in 1985, and seating plus some other items will be added by the end of the year.
